St. Philip's Episcopal Church, Bradford Springs, is located in the upper extremities of the High Hills of Santee near the Lee and Sumter County line. Its location, once in the midst of a thriving summer community, is now a remote rural area. The church, built in 1840, is a one-and-onehalf story Gothic Revival church with a gable-front building clad in weatherboard. It rests on piers of native stone and clay mortar (those on the perimeter of the church are covered in stucco). The front facade is three-ranked with a centrally-placed door flanked by two windows. The double front door, and the 9/9 sash windows throughout the building as well, are capped by pointed arches. The lower portion of the windows excluding the arched sections are closed by wooden shutters.

In the gable is another pointed arch and atop the front elevation of the church stands a simple wooden cross. The double front doors each feature two panels. The front steps are a simple flight of straight concrete block steps with a handrail on one side.

The rear elevation of the church has a gable end addition used for robing. The original appearance of the rear elevation was three-ranked, with a slightly-elevated central window flanked by two lower windows, all above the interior altar. Evidence of the one original flanking window can be seen above the present interior door to the addition. The small vestibule is approached by a simple set of concrete block steps and has a window on the rear elevation.

The interior of the church is as simple in design as its exterior. The church is entered through a small narthex which has stairs leading to the small balcony. The sanctuary has a simple dado or horizontal boards and a plain painted plaster field. The chancel is enclosed by a simple square wooden baluster. The original pulpits and altar remain in the church. The original pews were given to St. Christopher's Episcopal Church in Sumter after St. Philip's, Bradford Spring became inactive and still remain there. The balcony is adorned only by plain recessed panels and is supported by tapered wooden columns.

The cemetery adjoining the church dates to the founding of the congregation and is surrounded by a picket fence. The church and cemetery retain their historical integrity and are maintained by descendants of the original members of the congregation, though the church is presently inactive. The Diocese of Charleston, however, takes great interest in this historic church and provides appropriate support for its upkeep, as do the families associated with the church. St. Philip's Episcopal Church, Bradford Springs, built in 1840, is significant as an excellent example of vernacular Gothic Revival church architecture and for its association with the popular antebellum and postwar summer colony of Bradford Springs, then in Sumter District but now a part of Lee County. The church is a tangible link to the once-bustling, mid-19th century community of Bradford Springs, located in the "High Hills of the Santee."

This area was a summer resort for planters and their families seeking refuge from the heat and malaria of the South Carolina Lowcountry as well as the Midlands, and such families as the Sumters, Gaillards, Porchers, Stoneys, Frasers, Colcloughs, Capers, and Tates often spent from April to November here.

The springs themselves were granted to Nathaniel Bradford by 1785, when he owned 600 acres in the immediate vicinity. When Bradford sold an acre to John Smyth Richardson in 1806 and four acres to Dr. James Hartley they both retained privileges of using the mineral springs; by 1817 Benjamin Pierson had established a boarding house at the springs complete with bathing houses so that visitors could benefit from the supposed healing qualities of the Springs were also common sites for academies, and a waters. Dr. Patterson established an academy nearby which lasted only a short time before it failed. Reverend R.W. Bailey, however, founded an academy near Bradford Springs with more success; his institution flourished until about ca. 1850. In 1816, a Mrs. Campbell established a ladies' school at the springs, one which was apparently superceded by the Reverend Julius J. DuBose's Bradford Springs Female Academy between ca. 1835 and ca. 1848. When Dr. DuBose advertised the school for sale in 1848, it was described in detail. The main school building was 120 feet long with 25 to 30 rooms; two five-room cabins and a house adjoined the school. The school, later purchased by a group of local residents, became Harmony Female College and operated here until the Civil War.¹

In 1825 Robert Mills described Bradford Springs: "The neighborhood of Bradford's springs is dry and elevated, and considered most healthy . . . The waters are chalybeate [containing salts of iron], with a little sulphur, and prove

highly tonic when drank freely."² The springs became the location of a post office on the Sumter-to-Camden Road by 1816 and boasted two taverns by 1825.³ The neighborhood there was composed of primarily summer homes including Helicon, MacDonald, Hominy Hill, Summer Home, Leamington, the Tate House, Spring Hill, Orange Grove, the Williamson House, and General Thomas Sumter's South Mount of Sumter's Mount, where he lived until his death in 1832.⁴

It was in this thriving neighborhood that St. Philip's Episcopal Church, Bradford Springs, was founded in 1840. In that year Henry Britton deeded a two-acre tract to the trustees of the church: Peter W. Frasier, John A. Colclough, Alexander S. Tate, and James Gaillard. The land was located on the Bradford Springs Road and adjacent to the springs.⁵ The church was consecrated in services led by Bishop Gadsden and the Reverend Edward Philips of Camden on June 9, 1841. The first rector of the church was the Reverend Charles Pinckney Elliott, who was called to serve St. Philip's in Elliott was killed in a freak accident in 1851 when a 1846. tree fell on him during a tornado as he was on his way to The congregation of St. Philip's placed a marble services. obelisk in front of the church in Elliott's memory. The church had a succession of rectors after Elliott's death and was without a regular rector at several intervals throughout its subsequent history. The church is now an inactive congregation, but services are still occasionally held there.

The Civil War interrupted the seasonal migration of Lowcountry residents to the springs and after 1865 the neighborhood was composed primarily of local residents.
