DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The nucleus of the United Church of Christ in Keene is the 194-year-old 50x70-ft. frame of Keene's 4th meetinghouse raised June 28-30, 1786. This structure originally stood south of its present location, near the site of the Civil War Soldiers Monument today. Segt. Benjamin Archer, veteran of the Battle of Bunker Hill, was master carpenter and builder of the meeting-house, placed with its broad side and central doors facing down the wide expanse of Main Street. This church was "consecrated to the Divine Being" on Oct. 29, 1788, "a very handsome parish church," according to editor and essayist Joseph Dennie in 1790. It was painted white or light yellow with green doors; the interior arrangements were typical of their time. Almost all that remains easily recognizable of the 18th century construction today is the steep pitch of the central roof and some building features in the interior attic.

As soon as the division of religious and civil authorities in Keene was complete in 1828, and as plans for the development of the Common were formulated, the meetinghouse underwent its first major renovation. Under a Jan. 1, 1829 contract (fulfilled July 30) James Tewksbury and Samuel D. Goodwin of Charlestown, N. H., turned the structure one quarter around and moved it north almost to its present site. Here the building was brought up to date in keeping with prevailing taste by the construction of a shallow entrance bay and porch supported by four Ionic columns, closed pediment and 5-stage square and octagon tower and spire 130 ft. high. The interior arrangements were entirely altered. According to the 1829 contract, much of the renovation was inspired by the 1818 Fitzwilliam meetinghouse.

Finally in 1859-1860 the last major renovation and alterations were undertaken, again for the purpose of bringing the building in line with contemporary religious usage. The Worcester firm of Boyden & Ball was engaged for architectural plans while Joel Bullard of Alstead was the contractor. Moved back 4 ft., the building was raised to allow the introduction of a vestry below the auditorium. The sanctuary was enlarged; 138 pews on the main floor and 42 in the balcony. A new facade was added with elaborate decoration, Corinthian columns, pilasters, urns and enriched pediment and cornice surmounted by a rebuilt spire 152 ft 2 in. high.

The 60×90 -ft. church remains almost unchanged in appearance since its dedication Jan. 29, 1861. There have been some minor changes in the 60×70 -ft. and 30-ft. high auditorium; a kitchen was constructed in part of the vestry in 1870. This space was converted to chapel and office use in 1959-1960.

In 1924 a two-story brick parish house was erected adjacent to the church, and this structure was renovated and enlarged in 1959-1960. The most cataclysmic accident of recent history was the loss of part of the spire in the great 1938 hurricane. Roy O. Leonard of Framingham, Mass. restored 37 ft. 6 in. in exact duplication of the original. The church today remains almost as it appears in pioneer photographs of Central Square taken just after the close of the Civil War.

The importance of the United Church of Christ in Keene historically and architecturally is very striking. As the "First Church" has maintained a place close to the center of Keene life for over 200 years, its building has mirrored the history of the church and changing architectural tastes from the 18th century. The structure is an excellent example of sympathetic continued use of an historic building, and incorporates excellent proportions, appropriate design and a central location to become easily the community's preeminent It is the axis of busy Central Square and the focal point landmark. of converging streets into the business district, most especially the striking view up mile-long Main Street from the South. considerable distance of the surrounding hills and highways leading into the Keene Valley, it is the church and its graceful spire which first call attention to themselves. The church has become Keene's "trade-mark" on police shoulder patches, Boy Scout emblems, service club pins and in countless illustrations, postal cards and advertisements. Almost anyone who knows Keene or anything about it immediately identifies the community with the church which is among the best known landmarks in New Hampshire and perhaps New England.
