DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

In 1869 Sidney Barracks was relocated to its permanent site southeast of Sidney. The post's boundaries, as defined in General Orders from the Department of the Platte, dated April 1, 1872, commenced at the northwest corner of Section 32 Tl4N R49W, running east and west four hundred (400) feet and north and south eleven hundred (1,100) feet. The post was rectangular in plan, enclosed by a neat picket-fence.

In the autumn of 1869 the first buildings were erected on the permanent site and in the summer and autumn of 1870 the post was enlarged by the addition of several new buildings. By 1875 the Post contained quarters for three companies, five officers' quarters, one of which was the commander's, a hospital of three wards, guard house, bakery, laundress' quarters, stables, store-house, carpenter and blacksmith shops. Most of these buildings were of frame construction but a few were constructed with adobe lined walls. The buildings were positioned around the parade ground providing a picturesque military setting. To the east of the barracks were well cared for gardens. Each company was assigned a garden plot which they irrigated and cared for. Lodgepole Creek ran by the fort, directly to the south of its limits. Its waters were dammed and diverted into an irrigation ditch which in turn ran through the reservation. Trees and shrubs were planted along its banks and the waters were used for lawns and the $3\frac{1}{2}$ acre post gardens. The neat appearing buildings, the well kept grounds, and the tree shaded walks all contributed to the Fort becoming the showplace of the Sidney region.

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After Fort Sidney was abandoned in 1894 the buildings were gradually torn down for their lumber and the grounds became pasturelands. As the lands were sold the reservation was divided by expanding city streets and municiple additions. The remnants of Fort Sidney as they exist today are described in the following summary, (for location, see situation Maps).

1) 1108 6th Avenue; The Commanding Officers quarters, built ca. 1870, represents one of the first permanent structure built at Fort Sidney and is the only remaining home of the original "Officer's Row". The walls are of adobe construction covered with clapboard siding. It is two stories, containing 12 rooms, including a library and servant's room. From the front porch, the commander had full view of the parade field. In 1882 one story frame addition was added to the north side of the house.

The Cheyenne County Historical Association acquired the house in 1961 and started restoration in 1966. With the help of drawings from U.S. Army archives the house has been furnished and restored to the period prior to the closing of the Fort in 1894. The house, opened to the public in 1967, represents a prototype of early military housing design and construction.

2) 540 & 544 Jackson St.; The Bachelor Officer's Quarters, northeast of the original "Officer's Row", was the last addition to the Fort's officer housing. This one and one-half story duplex was built in 1884 and contained quarters for four officers. Each side of the duplex contained two bedroom chambers, in the upper story, and a parlor, dining room, kitchen and storage room on the bottom floor. Form 10-300a (July 1969)

7) Description

Architecturally the house is very straight forward and well thought out. It is of frame construction with a gabled roof. The upper half story has typical dormer projections to allow the use of full length windows. A veranda extends along the full length of the front half story, which in days of the Fort's existance would have faced onto the parade field.

The house is presently used as a private residence, attesting to the sound construction techniques of its early builders.

3) The powder magazine was one of the last additions to the Fort. It was built in 1887, constructed of limestone block, and octagonal in plan. It originally had a tin roof which has been replaced by conventional shingling. The structure contains one room, and has a exterior diameter of eighteen feet.

The magazine presently serves as a bedroom addition to the house directly to the south of it. The window on the west side of the magazine was the original entrance, which opened onto the parade field.

4) Southeast of the remaining Fort Sidney buildings, on Hwy. 19, are the remains of the largest butts of the rifle range. Lead bullets dating to the Fort's activity still can be found in the dirt mounds. These target butts, running perpendicular to the highway, formed the south end of the rifle range.

These buildings and target butts collectively form the Fort Sidney Historic District.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

U.S. Cavalry troops first occupied a temporary camp known as Sidney Barracks in the summer of 1867. The post was formally established by special order of the Department of the Platte, dated November 19, 1867. It was to serve as a subpost to Fort Sedgwich, Colorado and its primary service was to protect construction crews from hostile Indians during the building of the Union Pacific Railroad. At that time Sidney was at the end of the railroad construction line situated on a vast semi-arid short-grass plain known as Nebraska Territory, and popularly referred to as "The Great American Desert". For nearly two years the troops lived in a tent camp, served by one permanent structure, a blockhouse, which was used as a lookout.

In 1869 Sidney Barracks was relocated to a permanent site southeast of the town of Sidney, which had come into existence along with the Post's establishment. Sidney Barracts became Fort Sidney, an independent post, by Executive order dated May 14, 1874.

On August 9, 1874 General George A. Custer's expedition confirmed the discovery of gold in the Black Hills. This discovery generated the last gold rush within the limits of the United States. The discovery also endangered the last Sioux stronghold in the Dakotas. The principle barrier during 1875 to the occupancy of the Black Hills country was the refusal of the Sioux Chiefs to sign away their rights to the region. By 1875-76 failure to reach negotiations to gold field rights with the Sioux caused an unofficial opening of the Black Hills in violation of the 1868 treaty. During this period Sidney became a strategic Fort, being the farthest inland railhead, and supply point to the Black Hills prospecting fields.

The great onrush of prospectors was a decisive factor in the Indian troubles of 1874-1890. Fort Sidney was also in a strategic location during these Indian wars; forming a buffer between the hostile Sioux and the settled regions of Nebraska.

The Battle at Wounded Knee Creek, December, 1890, marked the last of the Indian skirmishes. The 21st Infantry Regiment from Fort Sidney participated in the battle along with the 17th Infantry from Fort Russell, the 2nd from Omaha, and remnants of Custer's 7th Cavalry. This was Fort Sidney's last major campaign. The fort was maintained until 1894, when the Indian Wars were over. On June 1, 1894 Companies D, F, and G, 27th Infantry departed from Fort Sidney enroute for Plattsburg, New York, thereby leaving Fort
