GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This is a 1 1/2-story, frame, single-family dwelling, now clad with cover-up siding. Built circa 1924, it features a side-gable roof, a facade gambrel dormer window, and an exterior-wall brick chimney. The facade features a bay window, covered by a hipped extension of the main roof. The house features paired windows with 4/1 double-hung sash. A newer 1-story wing stands at the rear of the building. An attached garage stands at the north side of the house.

Influenced by Period Revival styling, evident in the bay window, chimney, window configuration, and dormer, the design of the house may be derived from a popular catalog of the 1920s.

HOUSE

The main portion of the Klose House measures approximately 30' x 22'. An open front porch, measuring about 7' x 4', and a bay window, about 10' x 2', are situated under an extension of the main roof. This extension features hipped ends. The house rests on a brick foundation. The newer, 1-story addition at the rear, built circa 1958, measures $17' \times 16'$.

Of balloon frame construction, the clapboard of this house is now clad with cover-up siding. Although this siding is somewhat wider than the original clapboard, it appears to be reversible. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles. The newer addition at the rear is not visible from the facade. The building otherwise retains considerable integrity.

On the interior, Floors 1 and 2 feature hardwood floors. Interior finishes are plaster, with drywall in the newer addition at the rear. Five rooms are situated on the first floor, including two bedrooms. Two bedrooms are also situated on Floor 2. The living room contains a fireplace. The full basement is unfinished and features a concrete floor.

An attached garage, built contemporaneously with the house, is situated on its north elevation. It measures $14' \times 20'$. The small scale of this garage not only complements that of the house, it also calls attention to the modest proportions of these facilities built prior to World War II.

The house and attached garage are both in good condition.

SITE

The Klose House is situated on Lot 24 in Block 3 of the replatted Penn College Addition to the City of Oskaloosa. This parcel measures approximately 61' x 90' (width by depth) and is situated on the northeast corner of the intersection of Penn Boulevard and Rosenberger Avenue. The house faces west and stands one block south of the William Penn College campus.

The topography in this area is gently rolling. Penn Boulevard begins, at the south, on College Avenue and runs to Trueblood Avenue on the north, undulating down across a wide swale on its course. The boulevard terminates at the Iowa Yearly Meeting House-College Avenue Friends Church on the south and the William Penn College campus on the north. The Klose House stands along its northern rise.

Penn College Addition contains mostly single-family dwellings constructed since the 1920s. The Klose House is one of the oldest of these buildings.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANCE

Constructed circa 1924, the Dr. William H. and Mae R. Klose House possesses historic significance, under National Register Criterion A, because it calls attention to events and patterns associated with Penn College within the historic context "The Quaker Testimony in Oskaloosa, Iowa." The Klose House calls attention to the teaching career of Dr. Klose at Penn College, one of the twenty longest serving members of that institution. The dedication of these long-serving faculty helps explain the longevity of Penn College, which was often beset with troubles calling the institution's survival into question. Klose taught German at Penn College from 1918 to 1934. The Klose House is also significant under National Register Criterion A because it calls attention to the importance of the Kloses as pioneers in the settlement of the Penn College Addition. An important component of that college's finances, the platting and selling of these town lots helped the institution survive. The support of the Kloses, and several other Quaker families, was critical for this success. The Kloses purchased one town lot, constructed their home on it, and showed by their example the viability of this addition as a residential neighborhood at a time when it was only a rural pasture.

The period of significance, under National Register Criterion A, is circa 1924-1934, the time in which the Dr. Klose occupied this house as a member of the Penn College faculty.

The property contains one resource--the house and its attached garage.

EVENTS AND PATTERNS

Dr. Klose served on the Penn faculty for 16 years, teaching German during this period. As such, the Klose House illustrates the career of one of those twenty faculty and administrators who served Penn for the longest time. Prior to the construction of their new home, the Kloses lived at 631 North B Street from 1919 to 1924.

Penn College Addition was first platted in 1914 but few lots were sold. Following the disastrous fire at Main Building on the Penn campus, this addition was replatted in 1917. A number of Penn faculty and administrators purchased lots in this addition, but their improvement was slow. In fact, most of the lots remained unimproved into the late 1940s. The role of the pioneers of this addition--the Kloses, the Berrys, and the Stranahans--is significant because they provided Penn College needed financial support by purchasing land and showing by the example of their home construction that the addition was a viable real estate development.

Present occupants of the house are Adolph and Reye Goedeken. Adolph is a longtime professor of education at William Penn College, beginning his career there in 1963. The house thus also illustrates the tendency of Penn personnel to occupy homes where others associated with the college have also lived.

ARCHITECTURE

Although the design of this house may have originated from a professional source, this has not yet been documented. The building is influenced by Colonial Revival styling, including such features as the gambrel roofed dormer on the facade, the bay window on the first floor, and the side gabled main roof. The attached one-bay garage was a modern innovation for the time.

REPRESENTATION IN OTHER CULTURAL RESOURCES SURVEYS

The Klose House was surveyed in 1981 as part of the Area XV Regional Planning Commission's then comprehensive cultural resources surveys of Mahaska County. At that time, the Historical Survey did not identify or evaluate the building within the context of education in Oskaloosa. The Architectural Survey evaluated the building as not eligible for nomination, under National Register Criterion C. In the intervening years, more information has come to light regarding the Klose House and its place within the historic context "The Quaker Testimony in Oskaloosa, Iowa."

POTENTIAL FOR HISTORICAL ARCHAEOLOGY

Although the site's potential for archaeological research is, as yet, unevaluated, there appears to be little if any in this regard.
