# 7. Description

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Towne House, located at 1117 Cherry Street in Vicksburg, Mississippi, is a large, five-bay, two-story brick residence built in 1851. The structure is visually impressive because it sits on a hill facing west and is stuccoed to resemble rusticated stone. The body of the structure is painted a mustard color and the trim and quoines are painted white to give them more emphasis and making the house more imposing.

The most prominent feature of the house is the large, one-story verandah supported by six square stuccoed columns and decorated with a deep bracketed cornice. This design is continued around the perimeter of the building. The porch was added prior to 1886, replacing a simple two-tier portico. It appears that the stucco was also added to the entire building at this time. The entryway is very imposing with glazed double doors, an ovoid transom, a heavy bracketed cornice, and paneled surrounds. The windows are double hung with the lower sash containing a single light while the upper sash is composed of vertical panes which terminate in simple intersecting tracery at the sash head.

A one-story addition was made to the north side of the building prior to 1864. The cornice, columns, and windows of this addition mimic those of the original building. The cornice is very deep and hides the gable end of the roof covering this addition.

Much of the original character of the rear is not visible because of various additions made through the years. The porch was enclosed for a kitchen and a room was added to the second floor of the south side of the rear and elevated on square columns.

The structure is of a central hall plan with two rooms to the right of the stair and one to the left. An unusually wide L-shaped stair is elegantly detailed and leads to the second floor hall flanked by two rooms on each side. The house has been kept in excellent repair and maintains most all of the original decorative elements. These include finely detailed plaster medallions, brass chandeliers, marble mantels, and walnut pocket doors. There are several outbuildings to the rear of the structure and the yard is graced by a number of very large magnolia trees.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Towne House is significant architecturally as a visual reminder of the prosperous antebellum era in Vicksburg, Mississippi. The house was built ca. 1851 by Dr. A. L. Magruder and used as his office and residence. Its location on a hill overlooking downtown Vicksburg and its large magnolia trees give the house a very stately and imposing quality. All elements of the house are well crafted and finely detailed. There are many other two-story antebellum houses in Vicksburg, but none has a stuccoed exterior of this quality nor has been kept in such excellent repair.

Despite its close proximity to the Warren County Courthouse and its seemingly vulnerable position on a hill, the Towne House suffered only minor damage during the Civil War. After the war the new porch and stucco were added. They illustrate the prosperity that Vicksburg was witnessing following Reconstruction. These additions were made after Dr. Magruder sold the house to Nathaniel Thomas in 1869. The house changed hands again in 1900 when it was sold to Regina Hirsch, whose husband was a prominent Vicksburg lawyer, and again in 1907 when T. M. Morrissey bought the property (Warren County, Miss., Deed Book Records).

The Morrisseys were successful businessmen in Vicksburg during the first half of the twentieth century. T. M. Morrissey was president of the Morrissey-Easton Tractor Company and held major interests in Morrissey Construction Company and Morrissey Wholesale liquors.

Many of Vicksburg's antebellum homes have been destroyed or have been terribly mistreated and neglected over the years. The Towne House is one of the few of the city's mansions to have remained a single family dwelling and to have been maintained in excellent condition with no loss of integrity to the interior or exterior.
