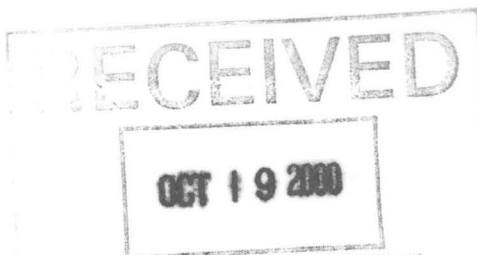

Description

Located on the corner of West Third and Cross Street in Little Rock, the Samuel P. Taylor Service Station is being nominated under **Criterion C** with **local significance** for its distinctive Art Deco characteristics. Built in 1938, the brick building with its black structural tiles and its decorative zig zag detailing is an excellent example of an Art Deco commercial building.

Elaboration

The Samuel P. Taylor Service Station, located at 1123 West Third Street in downtown Little Rock, is an excellent example of Art Deco architecture. The building is constructed of brick with black structural glass tile used as a decorative boarder at the base of the storefront; that in conjunction with the zig zag pattern at the top of the building gives the building a very distinct Art Deco feeling. The building sits atop a continuous concrete foundation and is topped by a flat roof with a small parapet.

West/Front

The building fronts west facing Cross Street. The façade is composed of two bays. The primary bay faces Cross Street and contains the principle storefront. The main entryway is beveled in the northwest corner of the building facing the street corner. The entryway is the most highly ornamented section of the building with glass structure tile from foundation up to the zig zag pattern that borders the rooftop. The doorway is flanked on each side by seven vertical glass blocks and is topped by a metal, Art Deco door hood. Located directly above the hood is a three panel by eight panel section of glass blocks. The main feature of the entryway is a florescent clock that is original to the building and is still operational. To the south of the door is a single pane picture window covered by a non-historic cloth awning.

Three garage work stations originally were located on the south end of the building. The original garage doors were removed on two of the workstations in 1989. The opening to the first space is now filled with a single pane glass door flanked on each side by non-historic two over one windows and also covered by an awning. The center workstation is infilled with six stationary windows. The final workstation still features its original wooden garage door, but has been capped with an awning. Today there is a neon sign above each of the three former workstations that read "Audio", "Visual", and "Communications" the current name of the building. Historically the neon signs had read "oil", "truck", and "brake". The left and right hand work areas have lights that still hang over the entryways. Bay two faces West Third Street and is the location of the third workstation mentioned in the above paragraph. The side of the bay faces west toward Cross Street, and is fenestrated by a panel of glass blocks that is twelve blocks tall by fifteen blocks wide.

South/Side

The buildings southern elevation is devoid of any ornamentation. There are no black glass structural tiles or glass block. The only decorative detailing is the transition is made from the lighter colored brick to a more common red brick. It is also fenestrated with two sixteen pane windows.

East/Rear

The east elevation displays brick on the southernmost end of the building and white brick comprises the remainder of the building. The area with red brick has two sixteen pane windows. In the northern end of the eastern side the Art Deco influence returns with two glass block panels. Both panels are four panes tall and three panes wide.

North/Side

The north elevation mimics the Art Deco detailing located on the façade as the ziz zag detailing accents the top of the building. There are also two parallel stripes made of glass structural tile that extend across the building above the wood door and picture window that fenestrate the north elevation.

According to Mr. Horton, some damage due to neglect occurred while in use by the Safeway Company. Mr. Horton made repairs to the building, which included the roof being resealed and repairs to the interior of the building due to water damage from the leaky roof. He also removed an original garage door and replaced it with picture windows and a glass door for his business. He also said that some of the glass structural tiles had been damaged when the building was recently hit by a car, but he is going to repair the damage with material consistent with that on the building.

Integrity

Even though alterations have occurred to the building it still maintains integrity. The wooden doors have been replaced on two of the work areas and awnings have been added, but the original black structural tile and original florescent clock still remain. Also the zig zag pattern that borders the roof line and the original glass block panels emphasize the building's integrity and significance as an Art Deco commercial building.

SUMMARY

Constructed in 1938, the Samuel P. Taylor Service Station is being nominated for its **local significance** under **Criterion C** because it embodies the distinctive characteristics of Art Deco architecture. It is also being nominated under **Criterion A** as a contributing resource to the historic context "Arkansas Highway History and Architecture, 1910-1965."

ELABORATION

The Samuel P. Taylor Service Station is located at the corner of Cross Street and West Third Street in downtown Little Rock. The building was constructed in 1938 on a lot previously owned by the Cross Street Christian Church. The church built a basement in 1935 and had planned to construct a church on the site, however money could not be raised and the church disbanded circa 1937. A man known as Mr. Saunders was hired to build a service station on the site. In 1938 the Samuel P. Taylor Service Station opened its doors to motorists.

The Samuel P. Taylor Service Station served motorists as a garage and gas station from its opening in 1938 until 1947. In 1947 the building was purchased by Paul Williamson and the name of the business was changed to Cross Town Gulf Service Station. Mr. Williamson served as the owner and operator of the Gulf Oil Company franchise until the business went out of operation in 1972. The building was purchased by the Safeway Corporation in 1973 and was used as storage by the Safeway Bakery Division located at 1111 West Third Street in Little Rock. It remained in the hands of the company until it was purchased by current owner Ken Horton in 1989. During the summer of 1989 he opened the building for business under the name Audio-Visual Communications. Although the building no longer serves as a service station it still greatly resembles its historic appearance and reminds those passing by of its original use.

SIGNIFICANCE

The Samuel P. Taylor Service Station is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with **local significance** under **Criterion C** as the best extant Art Deco design service station in downtown Little Rock. It is also being nominated under **Criterion A** for its association with the development of Arkansas highway culture, which is documented extensively in the multiple property listing. The Samuel P. Taylor Service Station is being submitted under the multiple property nomination "Arkansas Highway and Transportation Era Architecture, 1910-1965" in conjunction with the historic context "Arkansas Highway History and Architecture 1910-1965."

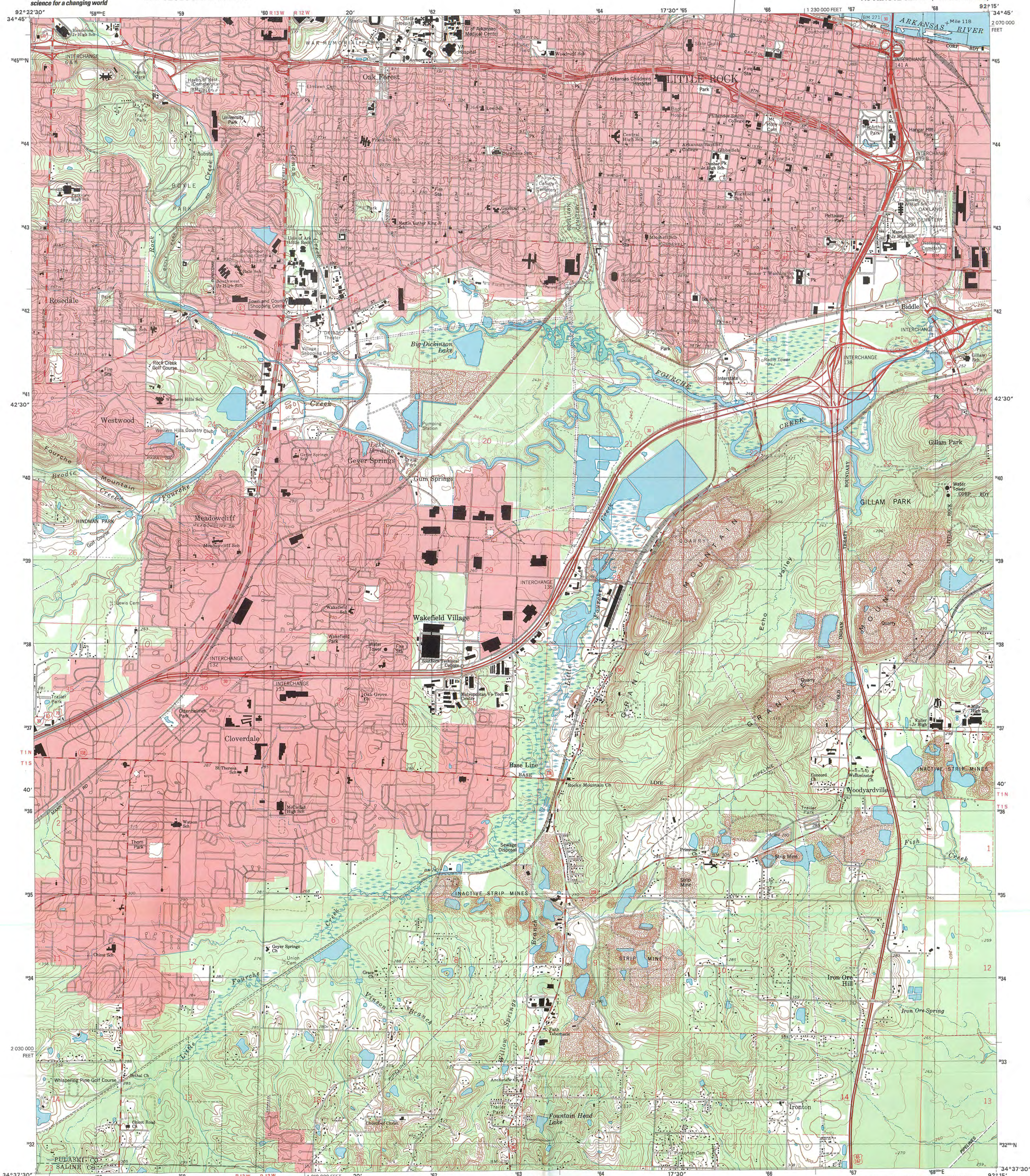
