

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#### **DESCRIPTION SUMMARY:**

The Jackson Collins House is a large 2-1/2-story hip-roofed brick dwelling constructed ca. 1886-87 in a prominent location on a major thoroughfare in Centreville, seat of Queen Anne's County, Maryland. The house exhibits Victorian eclecticism in its combination of elements from various popular styles applied to a traditional center-passage, single-pile floor plan. It retains a high degree of integrity, and exhibits refined detailing and careful craftsmanship typical of superior buildings of the period in the region.

#### **GENERAL DESCRIPTION:**

The Jackson Collins House is located on the east side of South Commerce Street, one of the main streets in Centreville. Constructed of pressed brick laid in common bond, the house stands 2-1/2 stories high and three bays wide, with a full-height ell extending to the rear. The hipped roof, originally clad in slate, is now covered in asphalt shingles. The entrance is located in the central bay of the east façade, comprising a paneled door flanked by sidelights and surmounted by a transom. The entrance bay breaks forward and rises to become a tower. The uppermost stage of the tower is lighted by a semicircular-arched 2/2 window, and is capped with a pyramidal roof above a bracketed cornice. The flanking bays, which also break slightly forward of the façade plane, hold large paired 1/1 windows on the ground floor, with 2/2 windows above, and dormers above small brick panels at the attic level. A porch spans the façade, supported on Tuscan columns. Windows throughout are set in segmental-arched openings and fitted with original louvered shutters. A two-story polygonal bay appears at the south end of the main block. A two-story frame porch is located on the south elevation of the ell.

The interior is organized in a single-pile, center-passage plan. Along the southern wall of the broad passage rises a gentle stair which features decorated step-ends, turned balusters, and an ornate Italianate newel with an original gas lamp. The parlor, located to the south of the passage, features an original marbleized slate mantel. The front room to the north has a white marble mantel (of the period, but not original to the house). The dining room is located in the ell behind the north room, with the kitchen and back stair located beyond it. Interior decorative detailing remains virtually intact throughout the house, including doors and hardware, complex molded architrave trim and baseboards.

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#### SIGNIFICANCE SUMMARY:

The Jackson Collins House is significant under Criterion C as one of the finest examples of residential architecture of the Victorian period in Queen Anne's County. Built in 1886-87, the building exemplifies the eclecticism of the period. Its irregular massing, multiple roof forms, and ornate brickwork are associated with the Queen Anne style, while other exterior and interior decorative features reflect Italianate influence. Its basic form and plan, however, are clearly related to the traditional vernacular architecture of the Eastern Shore region.

#### RESOURCE HISTORY AND HISTORIC CONTEXT

The following information was prepared by Orlando Ridout V based on his fieldwork and research, and is taken verbatim from Michael Bourne et al., eds., Architecture and Change in the Chesapeake, the tour guidebook for the 1998 conference of the Vernacular Architecture Forum, in which the Collins House was featured (see Section 9 for complete citation).

The brick house known as the Jackson Collins House was built ca. 1886-87 on part of Lot 11 North of the original plat for the town of Centreville. It seems likely that the house was built by Aaron Arlett to replace a story-and-a-half house that appears on the Sanborn Fire Insurance Map of 1885. In August 188, the property was purchased by John W. Perry, a local businessman. The purchase price of \$3262.00 indicates a substantial and valuable house was already standing on the property, and it seems likely that Arlett overextended himself and was forced to sell the house, possibly even before it was completed. The 1891 Sanborn map indicates the house was complete by that date, but Perry only lived here a little more than a decade before his death. It is useful to note that the decorative brick panels on the front façade of this house are also incorporated into the front of a small commercial building Perry built on Water Street in 1895. The brick house and lot passed to Zadock Collins in 1913 and remained in that family until recently. Jackson Collins, for whom the house is popularly named, occupied the property until his death in 1978; his widow, Elizabeth Harper Collins, died in 1990, and the house passed to S. Ray Buckingham and Dora Q. Buckingham in 1992. It has been carefully restored by the present owners over a four-year period.

The Collins House is typical of many refined Victorian houses on the Eastern Shore in that the stylistic trappings of the Victorian period have been incorporated into a traditional house form based on a center-passage, single-pile plan with additional bed chambers and service wing to the rear. This familiar form has been disguised somewhat by breaking the front elevation up into several different planes. The center bay breaks forward and is carried up three full stories in front to create a central tower topped by a turret-like chamber at garret level; the flanking window bays also project forward from the plane of the main elevation and are topped with ornamental dormers that rest on low brick plinths with shallow, recessed panels. A two-story, semi-octagonal window bay projects in similar fashion on the center of the south elevation, while the rear wing is tucked into the northeast corner of the rear elevation.

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The result is a bright and airy center-passage plan with public rooms flanking the passage and a refined dining room tucked in behind the front room on the north side. A secondary stair and service passage behind the dining room provide a buffer between the public part of the house and the kitchen to the rear, and permit discrete access to the bed chambers on the upper floors. The interior remains almost entirely original with the exception of the modern kitchen, period lighting fixtures, and the two first floor mantels. The marbleized slate mantel in the parlor is original to the house; the more elaborate Italian marble mantel (dated 1883 on the back) in the drawing room and the mahogany mantel in the dining room were purchased in Philadelphia and installed during the recent restoration. Also noteworthy is the original gas newel lamp at the foot of the staircase. The open section of the porch to the south was restored on the basis of original piers and paint ghosts. An iron fence fronting the property is a modern reproduction by the Krug Iron Works of Baltimore, an important manufacturer of ironwork since the early nineteenth century.

Boundary Justification: The nominated property, 0.856 acre, comprises the land historically associated with the resource, and encompasses the house within its immediate setting.
