7. Description

Situated on the northwest corner of Main Street and Dumont Avenue, the Bank of Bowdle (now a Youth Center) is a one-story, rectangular building with a front portico supported by Roman Doric columns. The cream-colored brick building has an unadorned frame entablature crowned by a brick parapet and a raised central entranceway flanked by rectangular windows. Four rectangular windows (one enclosed) are located between six unfluted decorative pilasters on the side (east) facade. The west facade shares a common wall with the building next door. The rear facade has two rectangular windows and a door. All of the windows in the building have retained their original transoms, sills and lintels. A small brick bhimney projects from the flat roof towards the rear of the building.

Although the ceilings have been covered with acoustic tile and the floors have been carpeted, the ceiling height and general floor plan of the building have been retained. The interior of the bank building displays much of the original woodwork including window and door surrounds, and baseboards. The elaborately carved door surround of the vault is especially beautiful with fluted Corinthian pilasters.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

As the oldest bank building in town, the intact Bank of Bowdle (now a Youth Center), is significant in the area of commerce.

Bowdle bacame a booming town after the completion of the railroad. Construction of the railroad began from Ipswich west and terminated at Bowdle. The Chicago, Milwaukee, and St. Paul to Bowdle was completed on September 9, 1886. During this year, two banking institutions were established in the town: the People's Bank and the Bank of Bowdle. The former bank had closed down by 1904 but the latter grew. From 1893 until 1909, the Bank of Bowdle was located at 445 Main Street until increased business necessitated expansion. The Bowdle Pioneer stated on October 29, 1908 that "work has been commenced on the New Bank building..." and, by February 11, 1909, the bank "commenced doing business in their new building... which is a fine place to do business in, and the best location in town." This location was at 3026 Main Street, the northwest corner of Main and Dumont Avenue.

As a reaction to the fire that destroyed a large portion of the downtown business district at the turn-of-the-century, the bank was the first building to be constructed of brick on Main Street. Every effort was made to design the securest building possible. The Victor Safe Company, which made the vault for the bank, advertised their "fire proof" and "burglar proof" safes as "bigger better and stronger than ever." Aesthetics were also an important consideration for the new building. The Bowdle Pioneer stated on November 19, 1908 that the bank "will be the prettiest building in the northwest part of the state," and, on December 24, 1908, "the interior finish is one of beauty and we doubt if its equal can be found in the state of South Dakota."

Although no longer functioning as a bank (it is now a Youth Center after being used for a bakery and post office), the building was still retained many of its original features including its exterior brickwork, Roman Doric columns supporting the front portico, fenestration, its interior woodwork and walk-in vault with elaborate wood carvings surrounding the door. The building today is a visual reminder of the once prosperous Bank of Bowdle.
