DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Fort Collins Post Office constructed in 1911, is a two story rectangular-shaped building with a red tile hipped roof and is located at the southwest corner of College and Oak Streets. The structure is built of reinforced concrete faced on the College and Oak Street facades with regular coursed limestone blocks. With its treatment of the window openings on the main floor and the panelled frieze on the second, coupled with the careful balance of visual elements and its simple, almost elegant lines, the building is a stylized example of Second Renaissance Revival architecture and is unique in Fort Collins.

The Oak Street facade is dominated by two pairs of large arched windows which flank the main entrance. The windows are composed of a large rectangular lxl double hung sash and two smaller lxl double hung sash windows. The entire group is topped by a transom which is defined by a semi-circular mullion with two members radiating from the arch. A similiar transom is located over the doorway above a limestone pendiment featuring volute supports. A large ornamental medallion with the letters "US" in the center flanked by two horns filled with fruit is centered above the words "Post Office" which appear in the pediment.

The overall design is brought to a satisfying conclusion by a large rectangular window which is located at each end of the facade, a balance to the central group. The window is topped by an entablature consisting of a limestone pediment with a volute design supporting the frieze. Directly above the windows is an ornamental medallion reminiscent of the large one over the entrance, that further reinforces the overall unity.

The College Street facade is similiar to the north side except there is one less pair of arched and double casement windows. There is a secondary entrance to which, like the main entrance, access is gained by a plain concrete step. Form No. 10-300a (Rev. 10-74)

A horizontal ornament runs along the north and east facades of the building, dividing it into two parts. Above this is a series of windows that reinforce the rhythm established by those of the lower section. Double casement windows are located at both ends of the facade, directly above the rectangular windows. Over each of the large arched windows and door is located a group of three windows made up of a square sash flanked by narrow rectangular sashes, and defined by limestone mullions. The total impression is of a panelled frieze with decorative shields in bas relief located in the "panels" or spaces between the windows.

The south and west sides of the building, not a public area, lack the limestone blocks or any ornamentation. A large covered loading area is on the south side of the building.

Within the exception of the doors, which have been modernized, the Fort Collins Post Office is unchanged. With its careful blend of architectural elements, it remains a fine example of an architectural stile unique to the town.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Fort Collins Post Office possesses architectural significance because it is an excellent stylized expression of Second Renaissance Revival architecture, a style unique in the town of Ft. Collins.

The Fort Collins Post Office was completed and occupied by October 5, 1912. The contractor was J.H. Weise and the supervising architect was James Knox Taylor. The first postmaster was Marshall Moore and John L. Nightingale was the Assistant Postmaster.

The Post Office, with its careful attention to scale and juxtaposition of architectural elements, is a stylized expression of Second Renaissance Revival Architecture, a syle unique in Ft. Collins. The overall impression is one of grace and grandeur due to its treatment of arched windows, the facade of the building and careful attention to detail. It reminds one of a Washington monument transported to the plains and cow country of Colorado.

The building is currently empty, however, there are plans underway to remodel the interior into a comfortable and convenient office space while retaining its unique exterior. Upon completion the building will once again play an important role in the life of Ft. Collins.
