Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Situated on level terrain in close proximity to Renfro Creek, the Bennett Hiatt House is a one and one-half story log dwelling which has been weatherboarded with a one and one-half story frame ell. The rectangular single-pen log house presents a fenestration of three bays with a central entrance flanked by double-hung rectangular windows of 6/6 pane. A later one-story, three-bay porch supported by square newel posts completes the facade. Exterior gable-end limestone slope shouldered chimneys, each with two 2/2 pane gable windows, set off the log portion, while the ell has an interior gable-end chimney. The west gable-end chimney is original to the log dwelling, but the east gable-end chimney was rebuilt in 1895 to replace the original deteriorated chimney. The gable roof is covered with galvanized tin, and a boxed cornice completes the structure. Ell fenestration is three-bay, and the original one-story, three-bay porch was enclosed many years ago.

The rectangular log dwelling has a hall-parlor plan with a thin partition dividing the two rooms. Interior woodwork is well-preserved and features reeded woodwork on the west room mantel, and on the front door and window frames. The entrance is enhanced by a six panel door, and an enclosed stairway with a board and batten door with a metal box lock is located in the rear corner of the west room. A plain but large mantel measuring over eight feet in length is found in the east room. Interior appointments for the ell include simple woodwork and four panel doors.

In close proximity are several outbuildings associated with the dwelling, and include a one-story frame privy, a single-story frame meathouse, a one-story frame woodshed, and a stuccoed limestone rootcellar. In addition, a one and one-half story weatherboarded log barn with saddle notching is situated behind the house.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Bennett Hiatt Log House is significant for its historical association with the exploration and settlement of Rockcastle County. The dwelling also possesses architectural significance as one of the best representations of a rectangular single-pen log structure in the county. As such, it is a good illustration of the first shelters built by early settlers in the Kentucky territory.

Rockcastle County was established in 1810 as the fifty-second county in Kentucky from parts of Knox, Lincoln, Madison, and Pulaski Counties. The first excursion by white men into Rockcastle County occurred in 1769 when Daniel Boone, John Findley, John Stewart, Joseph Holder, James Mooney, and William Cool from the Yadkin River Valley in North Carolina made their first exploration of the Kentucky Territory. By 1785 Samuel Taylor, who had obtained a Treasury Warrant for 2,000 acres from the Virginia Land Office, constructed a stone dwelling in the region. Five years later other settlements were established at Spout's Spring in the present town of Mt. Vernon, the county seat.

Bennett Hiatt was a son of Abner Hiatt who emigrated to Kentucky from Virginia ca.1804, and established a homestead near the town of Mt. Vernon. About 1828-29, Bennett Hiatt purchased land from John Cobb, an early settler in the region who had obtained Treasury Warrent #7281 issued by the Virginia Land Office on October 14, 1781, for a 1,000 acre tract in the Kentucky Territory. The younger Hiatt built the one and one-half story rectangular, single-pen log dwelling on level terrain near Renfro Creek which traversed his property. Having obtained fertile bottomland well-suited for agricultural pursuits, Hiatt engaged in general farming. It is probable that the log barn also was constructed at the same time as the dwelling. The one and one-half story frame ell was built after the Civil War.

The farmstead is still owned by the Hiatt Family. Mr. Jones B. Hiatt, the current owner, plans to rehabilitate the log dwelling as a house museum. Since the log dwelling is in close proximity to the Renfro Valley Tourist and Music Establishment, Mr. Hiatt is of the opinion that his proposal would be a successful venture.
