

SUMMARY

The Olga School is located on South Olga Road in the unincorporated town of Olga, Lee County, Florida. The one-story, Mediterranean Revival style school was constructed with a hollow tile structural system. The building has a truncated T-shaped plan. The exterior wall fabric is rough stucco and the building sits on a raised concrete foundation. The roof of the building is flat and encircled by a shaped parapet with tin coping. The Olga School contributes to the Historic Resources of Lee County, Florida, multiple property group under property type F.3., Education Buildings.

Setting

The Olga School is located on approximately three acres of land along the west side of South Olga Road. The building is set back approximately forty-five feet from the road on the northern half of the lot (photo 1). The property is planted with a variety of bushes and trees, including oak, palm, pine, and cypress. Vacant lots are to the north, south, and west of the school; to the east is an orange grove. Following its conversion to use as a community center in the 1960s, several landscape features have been added to the grounds, including tennis and shuffleboard courts, a picnic area, playground, and a noncontributing concrete block utility shed (photo 2). The southern half of the lot contains a sand and shell parking area.

EXTERIOR DESCRIPTION

The main facade of the Olga School faces east (photo 3). The entrance is set within a terra-cotta surround terminating in a decorative pediment with pointed urn finials resting on a simple entablature (photo 4). A fanlight is located above the glass entry door. Two casement windows are located on each side of the entrance. These windows are set in rectangular openings with masonry sills. Those closest to the door have six lights and those near the corners have twelve lights. Two original brass light fixtures flank the entrance.

The north and south elevations of the building are identical in their architectural composition (photos 5 and 6). The most

prominent feature is a large rectangular recessed panel with a masonry sill. Within this panel are two metal sash replacement windows. Hooded vents extend from the roof line above the panels. Original tin downspouts are located at the corners of each side elevation.

The rear (west) elevation contains a rectangular recessed panel similar to those found on the sides of the building (photo 7). This panel contains three metal sash replacement windows and is flanked by rectangular entrances. Each entrance is topped by a rectangular six-light transom (photo 8). Exterior chimneys are located at the corners of the rear elevation. The parapet between them is shaped.

INTERIOR DESCRIPTION

The interior of the Olga School is in excellent condition and retains much of its original appearance. The interior is divided into eight rooms that are accessed through a U-shaped hallway. The front entrance leads to a foyer with an elongated arch that opens into the main north-south running hallway (photo 9). Directly across from the foyer is the primary entrance to the auditorium. A small stage, elevated about two feet from the floor, is at the south end of the auditorium (photo 10). Original blackboards are located on the north and east walls of the auditorium (photo 11). A kitchen adjoins the foyer on the south and restrooms are located to the north. The north wing of the building contains a classroom, office, and storage area, while the south wing consists of a single large classroom (photo 12).

The rooms within the Olga School retain their original configuration. The walls are finished with textured plaster and the floors are tongue-and-groove pine. The original two-panel wood doors are still in place, as are the pine baseboards and door moldings.

ALTERATIONS

The most significant alteration to the Olga School is the removal of the original windows on the sides and rear of the building. In 1964 the rectangular openings where the original

windows were located were filled with concrete block and small metal sash windows were installed. All of the original exterior doors have also been replaced with modern aluminum and plate glass doors.

The only significant alterations to the interior also occurred during the 1964 remodelling. A wall dividing the south classroom into two rooms was removed. Drop ceilings were installed to provide space for air conditioning ducts. Two doors that led from the stage to the south hallway were removed and filled in.

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SUMMARY

The Olga School is locally significant under criteria A and C. It contributes to the Historic Resources of Lee County, Florida, multiple property group under property type F.3, Education Buildings and historic context III, The Florida Land Boom, 1919-1927. It is one of only a handful of buildings dating from the historic period that survive in the community and is the only surviving historic educational building in Olga. The Olga School has further significance under criterion C as an example of the work of local architect W. O. Sparklin and as the only surviving Mediterranean Revival style building the community.

HISTORIC CONTEXT

The Olga School was constructed as part of a general educational facility expansion initiated in Lee County during the Florida Land Boom years of the mid-1920s. High school enrollment in the county increased from 1,984 to 3,495 between 1924 and A similar increase in the lower grades caused severe 1927. overcrowding in what had become an antiquated system of small wood frame school buildings, most of which had been constructed in the 1890s and early 1900s. In response, the City of Fort Myers and the Lee County School Board undertook an ambitious program to construct new school buildings, upgrade equipment, and hire more qualified teachers. Fourteen new schools were constructed in the county during the Land Boom years, raising the total number of classrooms from eighty-seven in 1924 to 166 in Of the 137 teachers employed by the School Board in 1927, 1927. 101 were college graduates or had received two years of normal school training.

The most significant expenditure for new school construction was authorized under a \$983,000 bond issue let by the City of Fort Myers and Lee County in May 1926. Fort Myers was to receive the bulk of the funds for a \$750,000 school and a \$100,000 apartment building to house teachers. Other areas that were targeted for new schools were Tice, Bonita Springs, Estero, Alva, and Olga. All of the new school buildings were to be designed in the "Spanish style," incorporating large, well lit classrooms, auditoriums, and the most up-to-date educational equipment. The

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School Board also stipulated that only local firms be employed in the construction of the schools.

In March 1927 the Lee County School Board voted to advertise for bids for the construction of elementary school buildings at Olga, Bonita Springs, and Estero and a high school at Alva. In the next month eleven bids were received by the Board for the erection of an elementary school at Olga. Local contractor Edward W. Goodman was chosen to execute the design of the school's architect, W. O. Sparklin of Fort Myers. The land for the school was acquired in late April when the Board purchased three acres from Olga residents Ila and B.F. Walker. Construction commenced immediately after the property was acquired.

By the time the Olga School was completed in August 1927, the county was beginning to feel the effects of the collapse of the land boom. The onslaught of the Great Depression two years later took a heavy toll on Florida's rural agricultural communities, including Olga. The demise of the Olga School during the Great Depression is linked to broader trends in Florida's Depression Era history. As in other rural agricultural-based communities, Olga lost much its population during the Depression as locals were forced to abandon their farms to seek employment in the city. The Depression caused prices for locally produced crops to plunge and many people were forced to seek work or relief in Fort Myers or other cities. Bv 1931 the Olga School required only one teacher to administer a meager enrollment of thirteen pupils. In the ensuing seven years the total number of pupils never rose to more than nineteen and in 1938 the school was closed. The community did not fully recover until well after World War II.

The Olga school remained vacant until 1949 when the School Board leased it to the Olga Church for worship services at a cost of \$25.00 per year. In 1964 the school was leased to the community of Olga and converted to use as a community center. The building was remodelled and equipped with air conditioning. Tennis and shuffleboard courts, a picnic area, and a playground were added to the grounds.

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE:

The school's architect, W.O. Sparklin, was one of two Fort Myers architects selected by the School Board to execute plans for the education facilities that were to be constructed under the 1926 bond issue. His previous work in Fort Myers included designs for the Fort Myers Elk's Club building, the Starnes building in East Fort Myers, and a number of the city's residences.

When it opened for the 1927-1928 school year, the Olga School had four spacious classrooms, an auditorium, indoor bathroom facilities, and an office. Those features, reflecting contemporary architectural concepts in school design, were intended to promote a healthy and functional learning environment. Through its shaped parapet, textured stucco exterior wall fabric, and decorative terra-cotta door surround, the Olga School also reflects the extension of the Mediterranean Revival influence into the rural communities of south Florida in the Boom period of the 1920s. Although relatively modest in scale and architectural detail, the Olga School retains its integrity of design, materials, and workmanship to a high degree.
