The front facade of the Hans Swanson House is highly decorative. Triangular forms dominate the facade and the house as a whole, giving the basic box structure with cross gables a vertical direction. A covered veranda occupies the front facade. The veranda roof is supported by turned posts and scrollwork brackets. Triangular windows are set at the apex of each gable end. There are returning eaves and the house is clad in milled rustic The only noticeable exterior changes are a concrete block chimney and a modern window in the rear of the house.

#### History

This house was built by Hans Swanson, a native of Norway, who settled at Port Ludlow around 1890. Swanson worked as a stevedoring superintendent for the Puget Mill Company at the Port Ludlow mill. He chose to settle at this site because he wanted land to farm and wanted to be removed from the life of a mill town. A community settled around Swanson and became known as Swansonville, in honor of the first settler. Swanson first built a small house; he then began building the present house and completed it by 1909. His wife, Helene, is said to have taken care of the dairy herd while Hans worked at the mill. He later retired and occupied his time tending the small dairy farm. Hans Swanson died in 1946 at the age of ninety-two.

#### Evaluation of Significance b.

The Hans Swanson House is significant because it was the home of Hans Swanson, founder of the small community of Swansonville. Swansonville is approximately two miles from where the large Port Ludlow mill was located. There was a community that developed around the mill, but it was not suitable for farming and family life. Hans Swanson chose to be removed, and together with his wife Helene, they raised eight children away from the life of a mill town.
