Describe present and historic physical appearance.

St. James Episcopal Church (1901) is a Gothic Revival style building constructed of deep red chipped brick with limestone trim. It is located on the southwest corner of 1st Avenue East and South 3rd Street, two blocks east of the Square, and one block south of the Paradise Block Historic District. The church nearly fills the 60' x 120' lot. It has a north/south orientation, with the main entrance on the east side, and a massive 45' bell tower with crenellated roofline at the northeast corner. The east/west wing on the south is the "old" Episcopal church that was moved to the southern part of the lot to allow room for construction of the new building. The old church, to be used as Sunday School rooms, was veneered with brick to match the new building. Windows and doors throughout are topped by pointed Gothic arches. Brick buttresses have stone caps, matching the stone used for string courses on the tower and across the end of the chancel. A single chimney is located near the northwest corner of the old church. The rusticated surface formed by the chipped brick provides an interesting texture in contrast to the smooth stone. Original plans call for the brick to be laid in Flemish bond, but it was actually laid in running bond. Additional textural interst is found on the shingled gable ends. The windows have leaded diamond shaped lights, and all trim is painted russet to blend with the brick.

Tracings for this building, signed Frank E. Wetherell, and dated May 26, 1901, are available in the office of Wetherell & Ericsson. The firm of Wetherell & Harrison provided plans for remodeling in 1959. Since Frank E. Wetherell retired from active practice in 1931, it is unlikely that he was involved with the remodeling. It was done in such a manner however, as to be non-intrusive to the original design.

Originally a residence (parish house) sat on the lot to the west. This has been removed, providing an expanse of green lawn next to the church. A concrete ramp has been added to the west elevation to handicapped accessibility, provide but it is not intrusive. Immediately south of St. James is the brick 1st Baptist Church (1854-56). Directly across the street to the north is St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church (brick) from 1937, and the 1st Presbyterian Church (1881) was across the street north and one block west (that building was torn down when the new Presbyterian church was constructed in the 400 block of High Avenue East). St. James stands out from the other churches because of the color and texture of the brick exterior.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

St. James Episcopal Church is significant under Criterion C as the first Episcopal church designed by Frank E. Wetherell (1901). It meets Criterion Consideration A as a good example of Gothic Revival ecclesiastical design from the turn of the century. Wetherell became well known in later years for his Episcopal churches around the state (St. Mark's in Des Moines is usually mentioned along with St. James as good examples). While St. James was under construction, the newspaper noted that Wetherell had "closely adhered to Episcopal traditions and history in his plans. He has carefully studied the subject that was placed before him and the plans that he has submitted and that have been adopted, are the result of many weeks of research and study." (Oskaloosa Herald, 6 June 1901)

This building was designed after Wetherell returned to Oskaloosa from Peoria, but before he moved to Des Moines, and represents the early period of his development. In 1896 he had produced a drawing for a proposed new church that was included in the <u>Oskaloosa Times Souvenir</u> that was similar to the church built in 1901, but not identical. The 1901 design included two elements that were favorite devices of Wetherell: Brick laid in Flemish bond; and chipped brick to create a rusticated exterior surface. The Flemish bond was not carried out. This church set the precedent for future plans by Wetherell, and established him as a church architect.

St. James meets the integrity requirements set out in the Multiple Property Document under the "Works of Frank E. Wetherell: 1892-1931" context.

St. James Episcopal is one block south of High Avenue (Paradise Block). Note three other churches within one block: 1st Presbyterian, St. Mary's R.C., and 1st Baptist. The building in Block 18 immediately east of the Presbyterian church "being remodeled into flats," is another Wetherell design, C.L. Barnhouse Music Publishing Building. The Barnhouse building may also be a Register eligible property.
