
Roof/Chimneys: Hipped roof w/asphalt shingles; 3; 2 interior and 1 chimneys (right end & rear) Additional Architectural Description:

A turret-like protrusion, crowned by a conical roof, interrupts the front slope of the roof; the left end of the main facade is dominated by a squat, polygonal turret; notched modillions adorn the wide eaves of the front & right elevations; the double-door front entrance is set in a classical surround, consisting of fluted pilasters and a denticulated entablature; the wall surface to the right of the entrance is curvilinear and paneled; stone piers, upon which rest grouped columns, interrupt the balustrade of the wrap-around veranda; a portico (pediment& columns) is situated opposite the front entrance; a transomed oriel projects from the left elevation.

Built for Joseph Bardsley, this architecturally exuberant structure is one of the most prominent residences in the area. The sprawling lawns and elegant carriage house reinforce its prominent position. Moreover, it was featured in the July 1900 issue of Scientific American, Building Edition. The residence was described as having "excellent proportions, good detail, and attractive features". Photographs of the house and scale drawings of first floor stairway and arch details were published.  Christopher Myers, a long-time resident of the community, was the architect for the Scientific American Building Edition. Many of his Montclair residences were featured in this important publication.  This elegant, well-preserved residence is possibly the finest example of the architect's work in the town.
