DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Valley Lodge today is a wooden frame structure with a gable roof (shingled in wood), clapboard siding, and granite foundation. These details are to be seen in both the main part of the house and its ell which is attached to the rear of the house. The main part of the house is equipped with three large, square brick chimneys, while the ell has a single small chimney; all of these are internally placed. The main part of the house consists of two and a half stories, while the ell has just one story.

The principal (south) facade has five second - story windows, each twelve- over- eight. The first story has a central doorway with restrained federal - style lintel; to either side of this door is a pair of windows identical to the second-story ones. The gable - ends of the house are identical to each other on the second and half stories, with a single six-over-six window in the half story, and three twelve-overeight windows in the second story. On the first story, the gable-ends of the house differ from each other. end has a one-story open porch supported by three square posts. The house here The east gable-end has three-over-eight has three twelve-over-twelve windows. windows. There are two additional first-story twelve-over-eight windows, at the northern end of the east gable-end where the main part of the house has been extended northward.

Access to the ell is gained from the one-story porch at the west end of the house (referred to above), where there is a west-facing doorway with sidelights and a south-facing door of simple design. The west facade of the ell has three two-over-two windows. At the northern end the ell becomes a small barn with a wide sliding door on the west facade. On the northern end of the ell, on the east side, there is a simple lean-to addition with vertical board and batten siding.

Internally, Valley Lodge is extremely interesting, in that the present federal building in effect escapsulates a post-colonial cape. The chimney and room arrangements on the first floor reflect this phenomenon, with two long (east to west), but very narrow (north to south) federal parlots: The north wall of each was originally the main(south) facade of the earlier cape. The twin chimneys in these walls are a federal feature, while the third chimney, centrally positioned near the north side of the present house was originally the single center chimney of the post- colonial structure. At the north side of the present main house north of this 18th - century chimney is the original present kitchen of the house, which runs the entire length of the structure.

Across the road from the Valley Lodge house (to the west) lies a barn. This structure is not a part of this nomination to the National Register, although it is part of the same property. It is a simple frame building with gable roof and clapboard siding, painted red.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

One of the earliest surviving structures in the sparsely settled sections of Cumberland County west of Sebago Lake, Valley Lodge in East Baldwin is an interesting example of the development of an early homestead. Beginning as a simple Cape built in the wilderness, it was enlarged over the years into a sizeable and attractive farmhouse.

In 1788, Ephraim and David Brown came to Baldwin, then called Flintstown, from Concord, Massachusetts. Their father Captain David Brown (1733 - 1801), had fought in the Lexington - Concord battles and was one of the survivors of Captain Flint's Company, who were given a grant in the Baldwin area. Ephraim built the original one-and-a-half story cape which he called Valley Lodge in 1792 and David at about the same time erected a farmstead nearby which he called Saddle-back Farm. This structure is no longer standing.

Prior to building Valley Lodge, Ephraim Brown had assisted his father in surveying and making the first plot plan for Flintstown. He was one of the pillars of the early township, serving both as selectman and tax collector. He was also deeply involved in land speculation in the area.

Within a very few years after its construction, the original Cape proved inadequate for Ephraim Brown's growing family and he proceeded to build a significant addition or what might more properly be called an enlargement. This was done by enveloping the first building within a two-and-a-half story federal house with an entirely new facade constructed several feet in front of the old front wall. In the early 1800's an upstairs dormer was added and the original ell containing the summer kitchen was remodeled and extended to include a shed.

Valley Lodge remained in the Brown family well into the 20th century and, though largely used as a summer house after 1880, was the scene of annual family reunions for many years.

Attractively sited on the brow of a gradually sloping hill which runs down in a field from the front yard, Valley Lodge is once again a year round home though no longer used as a farm. It is well maintained by the present owner as befits a loral landmark associated with the town's earliest settlement.
