DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The First Baptist Church of Madison has been moved to the southwest corner of block 59 in Madison. Its major entry is on the west facade and into the 2 1/2 story tower on the southwest corner. tower is balanced by a semi-octagonal wing on the northwest corner of the building. Between these two protrusions runs a one story open porch. Double doors from both the wing and tower open onto the Stained glass windows of the main building are protected by the porch roof. The south facade of the church has as its central feature a Palladian stained glass window in the cross gable. There also stained glass windows in the first floor facade. In addition, on the south facade is the 2 1/2 story southwest tower and balancing it on the southeast corner is the semi-circular wing. This wing contains curved stained glass double hung sash. The entry on the south facade is a small portico with double doors and stained glass The east facade has the southeast semi-circular wing and a transom. small semi- hexagonal bay with doorway on the northeast. north facade again features a Palladian stained glass window in the cross gable, large stained glass windows on the first floor, and the northwest semi-octagonal wing.

The majority of the building is weatherboard; however, the semi-circular wing and semi-hexagonal bay are covered with drop siding and there are panels of wood shingles on the tower. As mentioned above, the windows are stained glass.

The interior plan of the church is octagonal (see sketch). The church furniture is original, as is the organ, built by George Kelgen & Son of St. Louis, Missouri. The pews are curved, carved oak. The wainscotting, altar rail, altar and pulpit, etc. are of longleaf yellow pine.

The ceiling is also covered in the same pine and displays the features of the roof trussing. The roof is a hip with four cross gables.

In addition to moving the structure in 1956, other notable alterations include: concrete block piers and steps; plywood partitions and hollow-core doors in the northeast bay and southeast semi-circular wing. The interior of the sanctuary, which is the major feature of the design is, however, intact.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The First Baptist Church of Madison is a rare example of the Queen Anne style in church architecture in Florida. Its existence can no doubt be attributed to Reverend Stephen Crockett of England who was pastor at First Baptist when the church was built in 1898.1

Crockett was said to be conversant with building techniques and was the major proponent of the new building. The design was a radical departure from contemporary Baptist churches in Florida, most of which were rectangular 3-bay Classic Revival style with central aisle.

As noted in the physical description, the facades of the church present a variety of aspects and massing; there is a 2 1/2 story tower, a semi-octagonal wing, a large semi-circular bay and three small entrance porches. There is variety also in the exterior fabrics of the church with the major portions in clapboard, the tower having a belt line of shingles and the semi-circular wing covered with curved drop siding. The fenestration is balanced but irregular with fixed sash, casements, double hung sash and Palladian windows in stained glass. While it may appear that the overall design lacks cohesion, this is not the case. In plan and mass the church presents a balanced aspect, the result of a conscious design.

In addition to the unusual (for Florida) exterior treatment, the interior bears no resemblance to contemporary Protestant church design. The First Baptist Church is octagonal. The traditional entry is through double doors from the southwest tower. The aisle proceeds from these doors diagonally across the nave to the altar The original carved oak pews sweep in arcs to each side of the The original altar furniture and organ are still in place. This furniture, the wainscotting and the entire ceiling are of longleaf yellow pine.


The ceiling is a central feature of the interior and is the one design element which forced Reverend Crockett to seek outside help. He chose Turner Dayis, a roof contractor, to aid in the construction of the trusses. The difficulty arose from the large open-span hip roof with four cross gables. Crockett and Davis successfully solved the roofing problems and today the composition, which is sheathed in yellow pine on the interior, is striking.


