DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Ely Homestead is located in a rural agricultural setting two miles northeast of Lafayette. It sits on the highest rise in an area of gently rolling hills, and commands an impressive view to the northwest across the Wabash River Valley. It sets approximately 125 yards back from the road with a double entry drive and is shaded by several large maple trees. Behind the house is a two-acres, man-made farm pond. The modern farm buildings associated with the property are located nearby, but not so close as to detract from the classic beauty of the home's structure.

Built in 1847 the home exhibits the clean, beautifully balanced lines of the Federal style of architecture. It is built of softly textured brick burned on the site. The interior walls are of the original plaster except for the ceilings which have been replaced with new sheetrock. Chair-rails, window casings and wood trim are mostly original. The small amount which has been replaced matches well. All floors are the original random width oak wood and are in excellent conditon.

Fireplaces, with original mantles, function well in the four front rooms. Modern dampers have been installed behind and above the firebrick.

After suffering several years of neglect, the home was purchased in 1971 by the present owners (great-granddaughter and husband of the original builder) and restored during 1972. The brick was gently cleaned and re-pointed (so called "Irish-weather-tuck"). Paint was removed from the bricks by hand with the assistance of an electric rotary sander. The front entrance had to be replaced, and after much searching, one of the same style and approximate age was found, retaining the small pane paneled casing. The dental trim at the top matches the gutter fascia or eve plate design. Cedar sawed shingles were procured for reroofing. Small pane (plastic inserts) give the windows their original appearance. The stairway in the entrance hall had been extremely steep and was rebuilt with a gentler incline and a square turn landing. Treads, rises and the cherry hand rail were carefully stripped, refinished and reused in the "new" stairs.

A single story wing which had extended at right angles from the rear of the home had been removed by previous owners. Using old photographs and remaining architectural clues, this wing was rebuilt, taking care to recreate the original proportions. This presented the opportunity to add modern kitchen and bath facilities to the total layout. A small brick patio on the west was added but is screended from view by attractive landscaping. A wooden deck porch to the rear, overlooking the pond is also screened from view by the main bulk of the house.

All rooms in the home have been attractively furnished with both modern and antique pieces, several of which are Ely family pieces original to the home.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Ely Homestead is an excellent example of Federal style architecture as practiced in Indiana during the first half of the nineteenth century. Care has been taken to preserve or restore the simple lines of the original structure.

The Ely Homestead is significant in local history as the home of Henry Ely, one of the first settlers in Tippecanoe County. Born in Pennsylvania in 1779, Ely ran away from home, made his way through Ohio, and settled in Indiana in 1825, one year before the creation of Tippecanoe County. Having purchased the land from the original "letters patent" holder, he built a log cabin and set about clearing the heavily wooded land. His marriage license (1826) is the third one recorded in Tippecanoe County. In 1847, after 21 years of marriage and the birth of eleven children, the Elys built this "modern" (for the day) home. Ely was a successful farmer who was respected throughout Fairfield Township for his honesty and good character. The home that he constructed reflected his high economic status in a rich agricultural area.

Except for fifteen years (1956-1971), the house has been and is now owned by descendants of the builders. It will continue to be an example of a Federal structure in a rural setting.
