Other salient features Semi-elliptical portal arches. Ten louvered side openings either side have truncated triangular arch heads. Solid, decorative S-curve brackets "carry" eaves at bridge ends. False beams exposed at gable ends. Concrete piers. Trestled approaches. Road width: 18'. Rated load limit: 39 tons.

Lane County utilized the State Highway Department's classic standardized bridge design of the period. A. C. Striker was the local Bridge Superintendent.

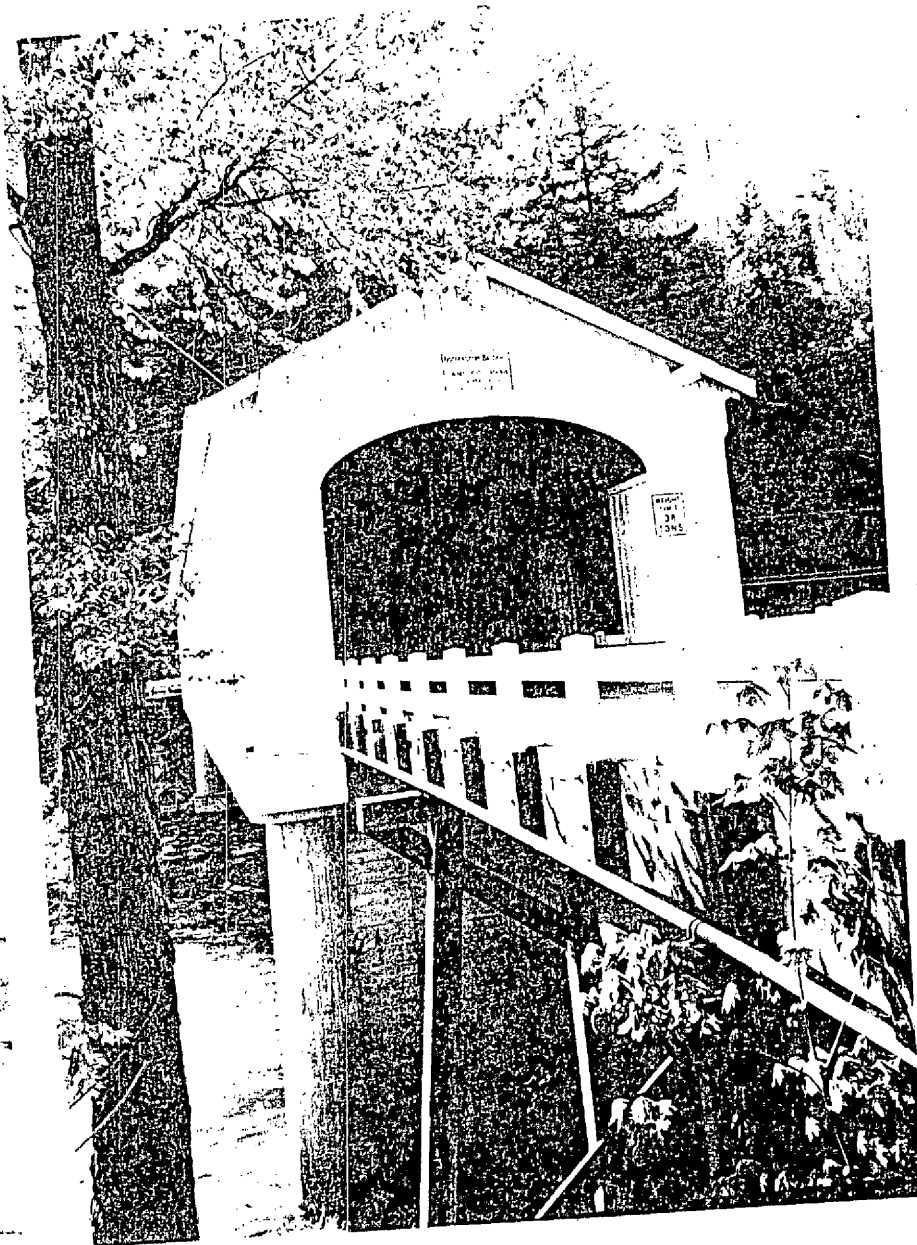
One of the most visible covered bridges in the state. Repairs made to chords and floor beams; stringers and deck replaced 1973. Some painting done in 1974. Holes in roof. County notes need for minor repairs to north portal.

Legal description is included in the appropriate County Road Department right-of-way files and County Deed Records.

West Elevation

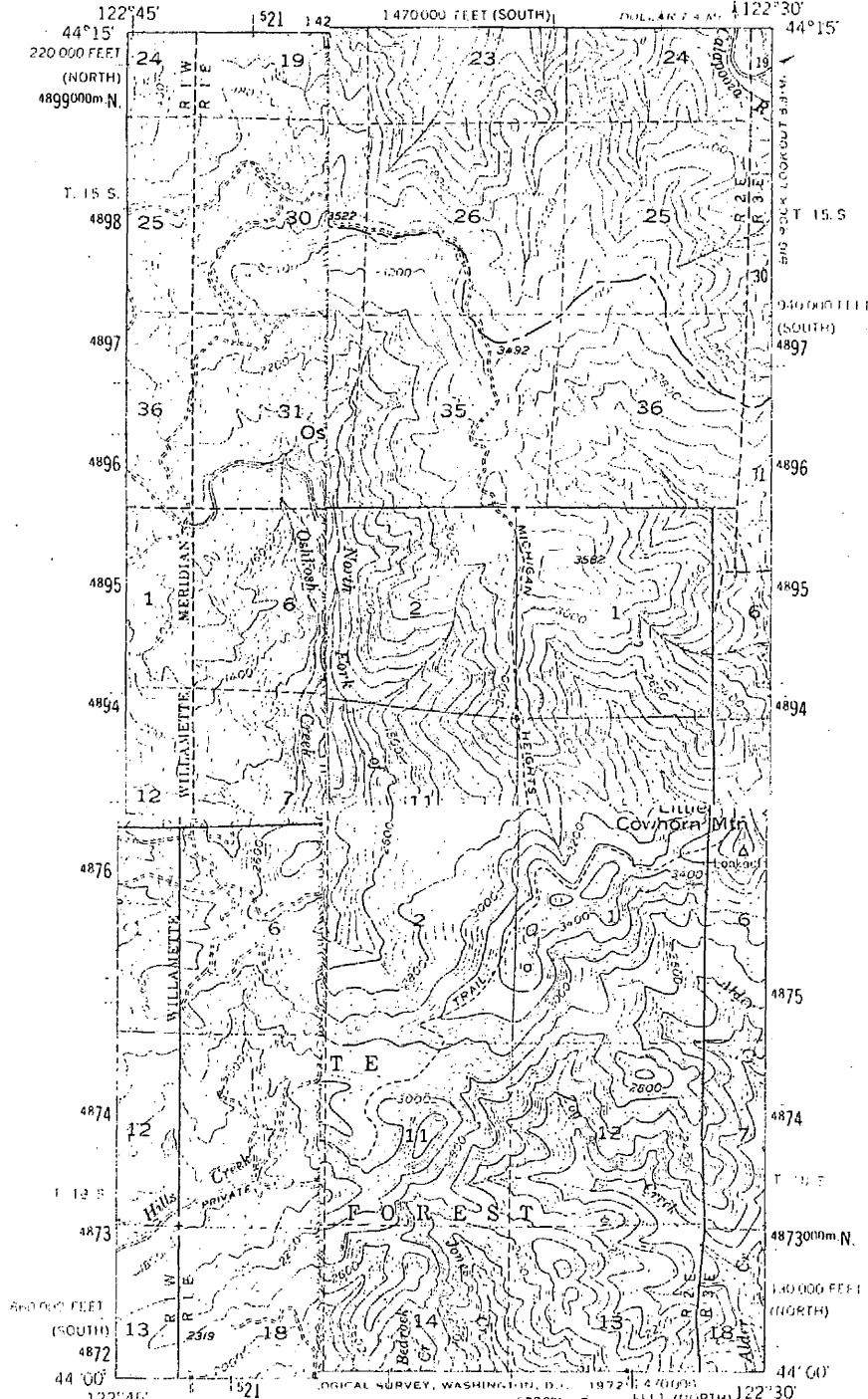

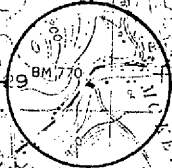

The Goodpasture Bridge is one of/most beautiful and most photographed covered bridges in the State. Designed by the State Highway Department and built by Lane County, the classical timeless architecture of this bridge is accentuated by Gothic style windows on both sides.

Lane County spent \$13,154 constructing the Goodpasture Bridge and is still reaping the benefits of a good investment. Unfortunately, both time and traffic are taking their tolls. The bridge is scheduled to be by-passed about 1980.

The nearby town of Vida was once called Gate Creek, resulting in confusion with Gales Creek in Washington County. "Vida" was selected as an alternate name because it was also the name of the daughter of postmaster Francis Peport. The Goodpasture family settled in an area near the town of Vida and gave their name to the bridge.

TO GET THERE:

Travel east of Springfield 24 miles to the community of Vida. The Goodpasture Bridge is located at the west edge of Vida.
