

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Haskell County Courthouse

Description: Condition: good, unaltered, original site

The Haskell County Courthouse is a three-story, buff brick structure with concrete insets beneath the second-floor windows. The windows of the first and second stories have expanses of pale green glass bricks and there is a green marble inset above the front doors. The building exhibits a simplified Art Deco sytling, with plain, straight lines. The front doorway is framed by a concrete facing decorated with vertical lines terminating in a leaf and rosette pattern at the top. The word "Courthouse" is inscribed above the entranceway. Windows are contemporary metal-framed glass, as are the doors. The structure has a concrete foundation and a flat roof.

Significance: 1931; Builder/architect: Unknown/Walter T. Vahlbarg
The Haskell County Courthouse is significant because it houses the county
offices and is vital to local government. It is also architecturally significant
because it is an example of a government building design which was influenced by
Art Deco styles. It is one of the few Oklahoma courthouses built prior to 1935
which departs from Neo-Classical and Revivalist sytles.
