

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The Great Falls Downtown Historic District includes fourteen contributing buildings and one non-contributing building on Dearborn Street between Church Street and Republic Street in the Town of Great Falls, in eastern Chester County on the Catawba River. The contributing properties represent the development of the downtown as a center of commerce between circa 1910 and circa 1930. The owners of the Republic Cotton Mills contracted with Joseph Emory Sirrine & Company of Greenville, South Carolina, to design the mills, residential villages, company store, bank building, theatre and store buildings. The theatre and store buildings were begun in 1921. Buildings #2, #3 and #6 through #14 (see list below) were designed by Sirrine & Company and all had similar details, including sandstone brick, sloped tar paper roofs, terra-cotta cornices, and white cast concrete cap parapets. Buildings #6 through #14 were designed with double display windows beside each entrance and transom glass above the windows. All buildings within the district are in a commercial setting which comprises most of the downtown area of Great Falls. The downtown is surrounded by three mill villages that housed the mill workers. Villages #1 and #2 are bordered by the Catawba River, a diversion canal, and three Duke hydro plants. Mill #3 is bordered by US Highway 21 and SC 200.

The following properties contribute to the character of the Great Falls Downtown Historic District:

1. The Company Store – 651 Dearborn Street (ca. 1910)

The Republic Cotton Mills constructed this two-story brick building in 1910 at a cost of \$8,000. **Exterior (Original and Present):**

There are double display windows on either side of the entrance. The brick walls have been painted white. The white paint has faded significantly. There are several chimneys, a hipped roof, jack arches, a central curvilinear gable and exposed rafter tails.

Interior (Original and Present):

The original wood flooring and pressed metal ceilings are still in repairable condition.

Uses During Period Of Significance:

This was the first commercial building in Great Falls. The street level contained grocery, drug, dry good, millinery and coffin departments. The first public school was located in the upper level until 1916 when it became the Masonic lodge hall. In 1921 the lower level became the McFadden Mercantile Company. Belk Department Stores took over the operation in 1939. One-half of the building was Belk Department Store and the other half was a pool room. It has been vacant since 1982 when the Belk store closed.

Alterations:

Permastone was applied to the front lower level of the building by the Belk Company, leaving all historic storefront material in place.

2. Republic Cotton Mills Bank and Store Building – 810 Dearborn Street (ca. 1917)

This two-story brick building was the first architecturally designed public building in the Town of Great Falls. It was designed and built by Joseph Emory Sirrine in the Renaissance Revival style for the Republic Cotton Mills at a cost of \$35,000.

Exterior (Original and Present):

Constructed of sandstone-colored brick, the building is organized with a full rusticated brick first level, a short second level of smooth brick, and a full entablature and roof parapet. Its first level street façade is five bays in width, consisting of three large segmental arched commercial windows foriginally all with a tripartite window division and corresponding paneled brick bulkhead; only the one to the far right of the façade or northernmost remains] with radiating voussoir. Between the three large bays are two limestone-surrounded double-leaf door infilled entry portals with denticulated shelf-architraves. Along the exposed, six-bay deep side elevation is a large plate glass window with transom at the front corner and five small square windows located high along the wall. A brick and terra cotta cornice separates the first and second levels. Eleven one-over-one light, double-hung sash windows line the street façade, with six along the side elevation. A soldier course and terra cotta moulding caps the windows and surrounds the building. Above this is a brick frieze and a denticulated and modillioned protruding cornice which wraps the front and side elevations. A brick roof parapet is capped with a cast stone coping. The building's condition is good. See alterations below.

Interior (Original and Present):

1st Floor – wood floor has been covered by tile, plaster walls have been paneled and pressed tin ceiling has been covered with a dropped ceiling.

2nd Floor – wood floor, plaster walls and ceiling consist of original materials.

Uses During Period Of Significance:

The property housed the financial, medical, legal and educational services for the developing community. The first floor was used as a bank, drugstore and post office. The second floor contained twelve (12) offices which were used by doctors, lawyers, dentists and as a public library. It has been empty since 1990.

Alterations:

The Town of Great Falls replaced the roof in 1998 with the same type materials. At an unknown date the window area was altered with gravel inserts and window treatments.

3. The Republic Theatre – 806 Dearborn Street (ca. 1921)

This property was individually listed in the National Register of Historic Places on November 26, 1980.

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4. Western Union Telegraph Office – 804 Dearborn Street (ca. 1930)

This one-story brick building was built by the Republic Cotton Mills to house the Western Union Telegraph office. It was later used as a medical office and is currently the home of the Great Falls Insurance Agency.

Exterior (Original and Present):

There is a corbeled base for the chimney stack. The original brick has been painted.

Interior (Original and Present):

The brick walls have been painted.

Uses During Period Of Significance:

This building originally housed the Western Union Telegraph Office.

Alterations:

Alterations consist of siding over front window and door with a corbeled cornice and exterior chimney flue. There are two windows on the side.

5. Ice House – 647 Dearborn Street (ca. 1919)

This one-story brick structure was built by The Republic Cotton Mills to house the manufacture of ice. It is currently an automotive repair shop.

Exterior (Original and Present):

There is a modern flat-roofed shed, segmental arched windows infilled with brick. The original brick wall has been painted.

Interior (Original and Present):

The original cement and brick interior remains.

Uses During Period Of Significance:

The building was originally used to manufacture ice.

Alterations:

The roof has been extended to accommodate the shed configuration. Bricked-in segmented arched windows.

Properties #6 through #14 constitute a commercial block. The interior and exterior descriptions are grouped together because the buildings share a common design and materials. The row of stores is composed of one-part commercial block buildings influenced by the Classical Revival Style. The buildings were designed by Joseph Emory Sirrine and built in 1921 by Potter and Shackleford of Greenville, S. C. at a cost of \$56,489.16. The funds were provided by The Republic Cotton Mills in order to provide a commercial district for the growing textile town.

Exterior (Original)

The exterior consists of a gabled and stepped parapet, coping, white glazed terra cotta tile ornamentation, lozenge-shaped tiles, white glazed terra cotta cornice, soldier course, and white glazed terra cotta rosettes. Square inset panel details have quatrefoil decorated frieze.

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The walls are constructed of light colored sandstone brick. Originally each building had a sloped and built-up commercial type roof. Each building had double display windows flanking the entrances, with transom glass above the windows. The transoms consisted of prismatic glass with operable hopper type ventilator panels. A few transoms remain.

Interior (Original)

The interior of the buildings in the block all originally featured plastered brick walls, pressed tin ceilings, and wood floors.

6. Furniture Store – 645 Dearborn Street (ca. 1921)

Uses During Period Of Significance:

This building originally housed a furniture store and a grocery store.

Alterations:

A fire on 1/13/99 destroyed the roof and contents. The interior features were destroyed. The structure is repairable.

7. Dry Goods Store – 641 Dearborn Street (ca. 1921)

Uses During Period Of Significance:

This building originally consisted of a dry goods store and later became the Francis Department Store.

Alterations:

Black Carrera glass has been added as a border to the windows.

8. Francis Department Store – 637 Dearborn Street (ca. 1921)

Uses During Period Of Significance:

This building was used as Francis Department Store.

Alterations:

Black Carrera glass has been added as a border to the windows. Composition board painted black has been placed at the bottom of the facade.

9. Barber Shop – 635 Dearborn Street (ca. 1921)

Uses During Period Of Significance:

This building was used as a barber shop and a beauty shop. It later became a women's clothing store.

Alterations:

The façade has been painted and a belcast shingled awning has been added. Modern materials have been placed on the interior surfaces.

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10. Dime Store – 633 Dearborn Street (ca. 1921)

Uses During Period Of Significance:

This building was used as a dime store until 1950 and has been vacant since then.

Alterations:

The roof has collapsed due to weather deterioration. Most of the façade is damaged, with only one piece of transom remaining. The windows are boarded up. The interior ceiling and wood flooring have been destroyed.

11. Candy Kitchen – 629 Dearborn Street (ca. 1921)

Uses During Period Of Significance:

This building was used as a candy kitchen originally and was later used as a bus station and a cafe.

Alterations:

Weather deterioration has resulted in serious damage to the building. The roof has collapsed and the display windows are boarded up. The transom windows are missing. The interior ceiling and wood flooring have been destroyed.

12. Grocery Store – 627 Dearborn Street (ca. 1921)

Uses During Period Of Significance:

This building was used as a men's clothing store and later as a pool room. It has been vacant for a number of years.

Alterations:

Weather deterioration has resulted in the collapse of the roof. The display windows are boarded up and no transom remains. The ceiling and wood flooring have been destroyed.

13. Dry Goods Store – 625 Dearborn Street (ca. 1921)

Uses During Period Of Significance:

This building was originally a dry goods store. It became a grocery store from 1940 to 1984, and is currently a beauty shop.

Alterations:

An air conditioner has been inserted in a portion of one transom. Interior materials remain.

14. Ford Motor Company – 623 Dearborn Street (ca. 1921)

Uses During Period Of Significance:

This building was originally used as a Ford Motor Company dealership. It is presently used for storage.

Alterations:

The entry has been altered. The interior surfaces have been covered with modern materials.

The Great Falls Downtown Historic District is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A for its association with the development of the Town of Great Falls from circa 1910 to circa 1930, and under Criterion C for its architecture which exemplifies the growth and development of a textile mill community in the Piedmont of South Carolina.

The "Great Falls of the Catawba" has been a well-known natural feature throughout the recorded history of the area. Robert Mills noted in his *Statistics of South Carolina* that the falls created a great roar. Benson J. Lossing (*The Pictorial Field-Book of the Revolution*, 1860) described the area as "wild and romantic. Almost the whole volume of the river is here compressed by a rugged island into a narrow channel...There are no perpendicular falls; but down a rocky bed the river tumbles in mingled rapids and cascades, roaring and foaming." The falls posed a barrier to navigation, and a company was formed in 1789 to build a canal to bypass the rapids. The vast water power available at the site was one of the factors in the location of a United States Armory on Mount Dearborn in 1802.

In the early part of the Twentieth Century, visionaries were planning for the industrial development of the South through the conversion of water power into electricity. Sites with hydroelectric potential along many rivers in the Piedmont of the Carolinas became logical places to develop textile mills. In 1905, the Southern Power Company (now known as Duke Energy) was chartered to develop the potential of the Great Falls of the Catawba. The principals in this endeavor were William States Lee, a pioneering engineer; Dr. W. Gill Wylie, a Chester County native who had gained prominence as a physician in New York; and James Buchanan Duke, industrialist and investor. Southern Power completed the first power house and dam at Great Falls in 1907. The three partners, along with other investors, also organized the Republic Textile Mills Company to capitalize on the abundant power made available at the site. The first mill was online by 1910 with a few hundred workers living around the mill and a company store. A second mill and mill village was in operation by 1917, and a third by 1923. The company also constructed a downtown commercial area to serve the new community. The town was named Great Falls in honor of the nearby natural feature. The Great Falls Downtown Historic District consists of the buildings constructed by the Republic Textile Mills Company between circa 1910 and circa 1930 to provide a commercial area to meet the needs of the mill workers and their families.4

The Great Falls Downtown Historic District possesses significance because it represents an intact collection of early twentieth century commercial buildings associated with the development of Great Falls. Thirteen of the fourteen contributing properties in the district were designed by Joseph Emory Sirrine, a noted South Carolina architect who was employed by the Republic Textile Mills Company. Most of the buildings reflect the Classical Revival style which was popular for many building types during the period of construction. The district is also significant because it reflects the development of commerce in the new mill town. In the early years of Great Falls, almost all the commercial activity in the community took place in the downtown area. The area included the mill-operated company store, the block of buildings which were made available to various commercial businesses, and the buildings which housed various services, such as the bank, medical offices, and telegraph office. While this collection of buildings is similar to those in many other towns of the period, it is unique in that the entire downtown was built by the mill company and is largely intact.
