## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Turnbull-Ritter House is a five-bay, 2½ story Classic Revival structure with double pile, central hall plan. The house is of wood frame construction on brick piers and is covered with weatherboard. Originally there were four brick exterior-end chimneys, however, only the two on the east end remain. On the north and south (entrance) facades there are one-story porches extending across all bays.

The gable roof with shallow eaves has a boxed cornice. There are no windows at the attic level. The first story windows are 9/9 double hung sash and those of the second floor are 6/6 double hung sash. All windows have plain surrounds with drip molds. Some exterior blinds remain on the second story. The entrance consists of double, panelled wood doors with sidelights. Each sidelight contains a panel of two rows of five panes.

The house is sited on a slight rise. To the northeast is an associated private cemetery.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Turnbull-Ritter House is a rare example of an unaltered 2½ story Classic Revival house built in antebellum Florida. In addition, the Turnbull family who owned the house for 60 years, were prominent in the affairs of Jefferson County.

The Turnbull-Ritter House is an unusual example of a relatively plain two story Classic Revival house. Most frame two story houses of the period in North Florida had incised two story porches and interior end chimneys. Although many of the present features of the porches are replacements, it appears that the building has always had one-story porches across the entire North and South facades. In addition the four exterior end chimneys serving fireplaces on both levels are unusual.

The earliest Turnbull to be associated with the house was Dr. Theodore Turnbull who is said to have moved to the county with his family in the 1830s. However, it was not until 1856 that Theodore Turnbull Jr. actually acquired the property on which his family appears to have been residing for some years.<sup>2</sup> In 1900 the property was still owned by a Turnbull.<sup>3</sup> From 1913 until the present the property has been owned by the Ritter family.

As is often the case where funds are lacking, deterioration has effected the fabric of the Turnbull-Ritter House. In 1965 the two west chimneys were lost in a storm. However, lack of funds has also prevented this building from suffering the fate of loss of integrity due to "Williamsburgizing," an all too frequent occurence. Structural damage to this building is minimal.

The outbuilding (shed) visible in Photo #1 is of 20th century construction and does not relate to the significance of this site.

The Greek Revival style which appeared in America in the 1820's is an adaptation of ancient Greek architecture. Initially designs were modeled on the temple form. However, in Florida many liberties were taken with the proportions and details of Classical forms. Because Florida builders "watered down" the precise designs of pattern books, Florida Greek Revival buildings are in large measure vernacular.

See answer to Number 7. The alteration of the ptoches has not affected the integrity of the building.

The current owners are farmers without sufficient means to maintain the property, although they certainly seem to care for it, having lived there (the present owner I understand was born there) for 66 years.

Exploration/settlement was checked as an area of significance because the earliest settlements of the American period in this part of Florida were made in the 1820's. The Turnbull family have been prominent in the county since the 1830's. While they did not acquire the property until 1856, they had been residing on it for some years prior to that date.

U.S.G.S. map does not accurately represent area or roads as of this date (note date of map). Interstate 10 (which this office had rerouted to avoid this site) has been in use for 4-5 years and runs through section 14 just north of the site. All county roads in the area were rerouted. The present boundaries represent, to the best of our ability to determine, the parcel of property identified in Jefferson County Deed Book H, p. 299, which is quoted as the boundary description. It does include the cemetery.
