foundation and continues beneath the gallery. Triple windows are limited the first floor and coupled pilasters trim the corners of the facade. Single pilasters spaced along the flank become piers to form a side gallery, over which the cornice drops to the architrave. The gallery has been enclosed. The brick pattern is either occasional (header - 2 stretcher) bond or unbonded.

The floor plan is an inverted L with the ell of six bays. The front foyer is a hall which has matching parlors on either side. These rooms each have enormous sliding doors made of poplar. The stairway has been relegated to a hall back of the front foyer. The kitchen was originally in the basement and the cooking fireplace is still in place. Stairs to this kitchen lead up to the room now used as the kitchen. Except for the later mantels on the parlor fireplaces, the woodwork in the house remains basically unchanged.

This 8,000 sq. foot house is located on a 41 acre horse farm. There is an office built in 1940 from material from the old market house in Lexington known as Jackson Hall, a guest house. A swimming pool and cabanna, an original smokehouse, a later ice house, a root cellar and several farm buildings.

for Dr. Henry Innes' son, Robert H. Innes. Robert married Miss Sophia Flournoy. She was related to two early pioneer families of the area, the Conns and the Flournoys. His farm was called "Buena Hill" which somehow got incorrectly changed to "Buenna Hill" over the years. He was a prosperous farmer and breeder of Short-Horn cattle and had at the head of his herd, a magnificent bull named "Second Duke of Cannondale". Mr. Innes was a Democrat and a member of the Christian Congregation at New Union. He had five children, Mary, Annie, Flournoy, Lena and Charlie.
