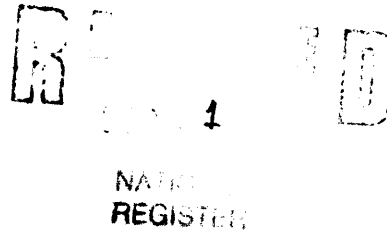

Statement of Significance

HISTORIC NAME: Sherwood, Andrew Jackson, House
ADDRESS: 257 E. Main Street

The Sherwood House is highly significant as an exceptionally well-preserved and excellent example of the Queen Anne style. The house, constructed in 1901, is one of two "high style" Queen Anne residences in the study area. The other building is the Paulson House (1906) at 86 N. Dean Street. These houses share a number of features characteristic of the Queen Anne style including asymmetrical plans, multiple roof forms, picturesque corner towers and decorative elements associated with the late Victorian eclectic styles. The Sherwood House is particularly noteworthy in the overall complexity of its massing and the profusion of decorative elements such as bargeboards, oriel windows with elegant consoles, spindlework, polygonal bays, and handsome corbelled chimney caps. The setting further enhances the house. The dwelling is nestled among a grove of mature Myrtle trees and the large lot is adorned with ornamental plantings and curvilinear concrete paths. A narrow drive encircles the house--probably constructed for horsedrawn carriages although a Model T could also navigate it--and connects Main with Collier Street. An iron hitching post is located adjacent to the drive at the main entrance.

The house was constructed for Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Jackson Sherwood. A.J. Sherwood was a prominent early citizen of Coquille. He was born in Iowa in 1858 and came to Coos County in 1883. Two years later he married Cynthia Rogers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Rogers of Coos River. The couple had five daughters: Claire, Emma, Gretchen, Helen, and Delia. Sherwood, a graduate of the University of Iowa, taught school for a short time after his arrival in Coos County. He also served as county school superintendent from 1886 to 1888 and opened a law practice in Coquille shortly afterward. Sherwood was one of the organizers of the First National Bank of Coquille, established in 1903, later serving as president of the bank until his death in 1929. Cynthia Sherwood died in 1950. The house remains in the Sherwood family to the present.
