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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Situated atop McCampbell's Hill, the E. W. Grove-Henry County High School is a two-and-a-half story rectangular building with raised basement. Sixty-two feet wide by one hundred-eighteen feet long, it consists of a central block with a two-bay wing on either side. A slightly projecting square tower with rounded buttresses finished with pyramidal roofs is located at the left corner of the central block while an octagonal bay is situated at the right corner. The exterior wall covering is grey pressed brick and the foundation, also brick, is covered with concrete which has been coursed to simulate cut stone. A stone watertable separates the basement level from the first floor.

A raised one story Neo-Classical style porch supported by four brick pillars extends the length of the central block. A decorative iron balustrade is connected by the pillars and is repeated on the porch roof. The main entrance, located in the north facade, consists of double leaf front door with sidelights and a multi-paned transom. Identical door units are located in the east and west elevations with the complete entrance consisting of brick pilasters supporting a denticulated architrave and cornice. Windows vary in style and size. Styles include: six-over-xix, four-over-four, and two-over-two sash; four-paned casement; nine-pane circular; and round arched with and without key-stones. Window trim consists of cut stone sills and lintels. Two steeply pitched gable dormers are located on the north facade and have rounded buttresses on either side; one dormer with hipped roof is centrally located on both the east and west facades. A hipped roof covers the main building. The turret has a tent roof while the tower has a pyramidal roof; both have decorative metal finials. The roof covering is asphalt shingles.

Structurally, the building is in good condition. The exterior has not been altered other than the replacement of the original roof material. Interior alterations have been minimal with none of the original material being removed.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

- E. W. Grove-Henry County High School, built in 1905-1906, is significant for its associations with the development of public education in Henry County, Tennessee. The building, designed by Architect R. H. Hunt, is significant in its architectural craftsmanship.
- E. W. Grove moved to Paris in 1874 to become clerk and prescriptionist at Dr. S. H.Caldwell's drugstore. He soon entered into a partnership with Caldwell and within a few years he purchased the entire stock and became owner of the drugstore. During the years Grove lived in Paris, he perfected a tonic of tasteless quinine for chills associated with fevers and malaria. With success of this tonic, Grove established the Paris Medicine Company. In 1889 Dr. Grove moved his company to St. Louis, Missouri where a laboratory and manufactory were constructed.

The first step toward free public education on the secondary level in Henry County was taken in 1902 when Dr. Grove submitted a proposition to the Henry County Quarterly Court giving the county \$20,000.00 to erect a high school. This proposition was rejected by the court. A second proposal was submitted in July 1905. This proposal called for the appropriation of \$40,000.00 for the purchase of land and the construction of an educational institution by Henry County and the city of Paris. In turn, Dr. Grove would provide an endowment fund of \$50,000.00 for the maintenance and operation of the school. The court accepted Dr. Grove's proposal. On June 26, 1906 the cornerstone of the E. W. Grove-Henry County High School was laid.

On March 1, 1917 Albert Williams, state superintendent of public instruction, organized a vocational agriculture course at E. W. Grove-Henry County High School. This was the first department to be developed under the provision of the Smith-Hughes Act signed by President Woodrow Wilson on February 23, 1917.

The design of the educational institution was the product of the Chattanooga architectural firm of R. H. Hunt and Company. Hunt was one of the South's most widely known architects and his company had established itself as a most productive architectural design firm. Architectural styles employed by Hunt could be categorized by a building's type or function. Most of his designs derive their significant architectural features from Greek or Roman classicism and various Victorian styles.

E. W. Grove-Henry County High School is an example of Hunt's functional building designs. Although it is not lavishly decorated, it reflects both Neo-Classical and Romanesque features which were popular during his career as an architect.
