Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Athens-Candler-Church Street Historic District is located northwest of the central business district in Winder, Barrow County, Georgia, in the area around Athens, Candler, Church, and Center Streets, and Midland Avenue. The district is comprised primarily of late 19th- and early 20th-century residential buildings in a variety of styles and two early 20th-century churches.

Houses are one or two stories and are constructed of brick or wood. Representative styles include Neoclassical, Georgian Revival, Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, Folk Victorian, Bungalow/Craftsman, and plain vernacular cottage.

Some of the notable one-story Folk Victorian residences that have decorative gables include the Thompson-Summerour Cottage at 434 Athens Street, the Smith-House Cottage at 500 Athens Street, the House-Canup Residence at 218 Church Street, the Cargill-Lanthier Cottage at 404 Athens Street, and the Hill-Patton House at 432 Athens Street.

The district has several large two-story, wood-framed Colonial Revival houses which include the McCants-Miller House, ca. 1897, at 313 Candler Street, the O'Neal-Healen House at 113 Church Street, the Robinson-Patton House at 432 Athens Street, and the Hill-Williams-Patrick House at 438 Athens Street. The Old Methodist Parsonage at 108 Center Street, built around 1907, is a Colonial Revival structure with central gambrel roofed gable.

There are many large two-story, wood-framed and brick houses located along Candler Street. The Jackson-Johns House at 116 Candler, is a Neoclassical style brick structure with monumental porch across the front facade. It is individually listed in the National Register. The DeLaPierre-Perry-Ferguson House, at 201 Candler, built around 1887, also has a large monumental porch supported by square piers with an insert balcony on the second level above the central portal. The Hillman-Jackson House at 26 Candler, constructed around 1900, has three gables with decorative details on the central facade roof. It has a monumental front porch with Corinthian columns and second story balcony above the central portal.

One of the oldest houses in the district is the William-Hill House at 438 Athens Street, constructed around 1887. It is a two-story, wood-framed building with one-story front porch and two-story entrance with gabled roof projecting in the center of the main facade.

Candler Street has several early 20th century Bungalow/Craftsman style houses which include the McCurry-Almond-Winder House at 222 Candler, the Maynard-Krueger House (ca. 1912) at 314 Candler, and the Lanthier House (ca. 1902) at 306 Candler.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Athens-Candler-Church Street Historic District is significant in the areas of architecture, religion, social/humanitarian, and social history.

In terms of <u>architecture</u>, the district is important for its collection of late 19th-and early 20th-century residential buildings, constructed in a variety of revival styles, and two churches constructed in the early 1900s. Representative styles include Folk Victorian, Neoclassical, Georgian Revival, Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, and Bungalow/Craftsman, all of which were common in towns in Georgia and the southeast in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

The district is significant in the area of religion for its historic churches, which included the former Winder Methodist Church (that is currently a restaurant) and the Winder Presbyterian Church (currently the Fellowship Baptist Church). Constructed in 1904, the Methodist Church is a red brick building with Gothic arched windows. In 1894 the Jug Tavern Methodist Church changed its name to the Winder Methodist Church; the congregation remained at the church until 1964. A Presbyterian church was organized in Winder in 1895, and the church building was constructed in 1895. Both of these religious institutions served the needs of the community of Winder in the early 20th century. In 1970, the Presbyterian church became the Fellowship Baptist Church.

In the area of <u>social/humanitarian</u> concerns, the district is important for the Women's Club, an organization founded in 1920 to sponsor youth programs, contribute to charity organizations, and assist with educational activities. The purpose of the organization was also to work towards the beautification of the town of Winder and to provide volunteer support for welfare and other programs of the federal government. The group became affiliated with the Georgia Federation of Women's Clubs.

The district is significant in the area of <u>social history</u> for its association with many of Winder's early merchants, some of whom included A.D. McCurry, E.A. Starr, J.W. Summerour, Walter Wood, Tom Maynard, John Maynard, Harry Segars, and others. Joseph Dillard Quillian, an attorney, who moved to Winder after being admitted to the Georgia Bar Association in 1915, lived in the historic district, as did Edith House, the daughter of Lucius House, a mayor of Winder. She was the first woman to graduate from the University of Georgia Law School. Mrs. C.B. Almond, who resided at a house still standing at 222 Candler Street, initiated Doctor's Day in 1930, a nationally recognized event.



Another Craftsman style residence is the Randolph-Swafford House at 506 Athens Street, constructed around 1907. Craftsman style detailing is evident in the Matthews-Lynch House located at 217 Candler. This two-story brick house has a hipped roof with wide, unenclosed eave overhang.

Two houses which have rusticated masonry are the Durst-Hargroves-Nicholson House at 317 Candler, a one-story building with rusticated masonry facade and square column porch supports, and the Carithers-Shedd House (ca. 1912) at 203 Candler. This two-story wood-framed house has a one-story front porch with rusticated masonry piers with pair square column above.

Two churches within the district are the Old Methodist Church (ca. 1904), currently the Master's Table Restaurant located on the corner of Candler and Center Streets, and the Old Presbyterian Church (currently the Fellowship Baptist Church), located on the corner of Athens and Beulah Streets.

The Winder Woman's Club building, constructed around 1931, is located on Midland Avenue in the southeastern edge of the district. Properties within the district are informally landscaped with oak, hickory, and magnolia trees, and crepe myrtle. The terrain is slightly undulating with a gradual downward slope along Betts Street.

The areas to the south and southwest of the district consist of non-historic commercial and residential buildings. A non-historic school is located immediately north of the district, and the North Broad Street Residential National Register Historic District is located to the northeast.
