14. Site Plan (and boundary description and justification for N.R. sites):

The property is an early twentieth century, two story, frame farmhouse, located on the east side of the Zaring Mill Road in south central Shelby County, an area of productive, rolling farmland in the southeast corner of the Shelbyville soil belt. The property boundaries include the front, side and rear domestic yard of the house, excluding a noncontributing garage and shed. Beginning at the northeast corner of the rear yard, at a point 75' northeast of the northeast corner of the house, go approximately 200 feet south along the yard fence line to the south yard fenceline, then west approximately 400 feet along that fenceline to the east edge of Zaring Mill Road, the north along the road edge approximately 200 feet to the fenceline marking the north yard boundary, then east 400 feet along that fenceline to the point of origin.

45. Description and House Plan:

The site consists of a single, two-story, frame, early 20th century farm house, located south of Shelbyville on the Zaring Mill or Old Taylorsville Road. The area is rural with large, established farms and few five acre tracts containing recently constructed homes. The house is sited back from the road about 200 feet, surrounded by a fenced, lanscaped yard area with evergreen shrubs, flowering trees and bushes, and mature maple trees. A new concrete block garage, concrete block dairy barn and milk house are not included within the site boundaries because of their recent dates of construction.

The residence is Frincess Anne in plan and form with an irregular, two story, side passage plan and a steeply-hipped roof with three asymmetrically placed cross gables. The Princess Anne, an unadorned follow-up to the Queen Anne borrowed the asymmetrical plan and form, but avoided a multi-textured exterior in favor of more utilitarian finishes. Features of the residence include sawn frame construction; concrete foundation; plain weatherboard sheathing; single light sash windows with simply molded hoods; two interior brick chimneys; a recessed second story porch with turned columns and spindle rail, and a front porch with Tuscan columns that curves across the (continued)

Century. The house is Princess Anne, a turn-of-the-century "style" that borrowed plan and form from the Queen Anne but avoided the obvious display of non-functional texture and materials. In Shelby County, the Princess Anne is rare in comparrison to the two-story T-plan, a popular form variation on the long established center passage plan. This unique house illustrates the break from long-established traditions of ordered domestic spaces and familiar exterior forms that began to take place at the turn-of-the-century.

north and west front facades. A rear, one-story addition faces east and contains the kitchen and an enclosed porch and bath. Interior wood work was recently oak grained and has bullseye corner blocks. Three downstaire and one upstairs mantles remain. The rear addition is sided in similar material to the main porion; its shed roof silouette a common addition to farm homes in the area.

The nominated area includes one contributing building.
