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#### Description

During the Railroad Era (1870-1914) in White County a variety of vernacular houses were constructed. They were also built out of a variety of materials. Intact surviving examples from this period, however, are somewhat limited. The Joe Brown House is a good example of a one-story, frame, double-pen building. It is covered by corrugated metal gable roofs, its walls are clad with weatherboard or board and batten, and the entire structure rests on a stone pier foundation. The building was constructed c. 1890, and has several historic alterations. It is currently unoccupied and deteriorating rapidly.

Located one mile south of the termination of County Road 529 this building is only two miles northeast of the crossroads community of Little Red. The main, or east, elevation of the house is very simply arranged. It consists of two single board and batten doors, constructed with square nails flush board is found between them. These doors are covered by a shed roofed porch that extends across half of the facade. The porch is supported by wooden posts. Fenestration along this elevation consists of either single or paired four-over-four double-hung wood sash windows; in some cases either sash or glazing is missing but notches in the frame corroborate the type of windows that the structure originally had.

Exterior cut stone chimneys are found at both gable ends of the original structure the chimney on the northern elevation has been partially demolished. The cellar under the northern pen is accessed by an opening east of the partially demolished chimney. The east elevation of the cellar is relieved by an awning window that has had its glazing removed. A one-story, double-pen box addition is located on the west elevation of the original northern pen. This addition has a sheet metal gabled roof, and exterior walls clad with board and batten siding which has been partially covered with brick patterned asphalt roll. A shed roofed porch, supported by wooden posts, extends from the eastern end of the addition's north elevation and extends three-quarters of the way westward along this elevation. The eastern pen of this addition is entered by a centrally placed door that is flanked by single windows that have had all sash and glazing removed. The western pen is entered by a single door, slightly east of center, and has a single window on this elevation. This window also has had all sash and glazing removed. The gable end is relieved by a single, centrally placed window that is in the same state of disrepair as the others. An ell shaped porch extends from south elevation of the addition to the edge of the south elevation of the southern pen of the original building.

A well is located on this porch. Also included in this nomination are the remains of a log smokehouse that is located approximately forty feet south of the main building, and the remains of a double crib log barn found approximately three hundred feet southwest of the original building.

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#### Significance

When this building was constructed, c. 1890, it was one of numerous one-story, frame double-pen houses built in White County during the Railroad Era. While there are eighty-five of these houses which survive in the county, few reflect the period in which they were constructed. Though the Joe Brown House today reveals the impact of several additions it is still a good example of the way that houses have evolved through the years from very small floorplans to larger versions. This house has even combined the two most popular construction techniques, frame and box, under one roof. The existence of a partial cellar is somewhat rare in the county due to the fact that most of the county is prone to flooding.

This house was built by Joe Brown and Ben Reaper as a residence for Brown. Brown purchased this land on June 29, 1889 while Reaper purchased the adjoining one hundred and sixty acres. Both of these men moved to this area from Coal Hill in Johnson County. Reaper, however, was originally from Wheelerburg, Ohio.

The Joe Brown House is being nominated under Criterion C with local significance because of the insight it provides into historic construction techniques and styles.

#### Verbal Boundary Description:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of a line running along the northern edge of the private drive with a perpendicular line running along the eastern elevation of the house (a point located on the northern edge of the drive approximately 6,200 feet south of the southern terminus of County Road 529), proceed northerly along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the northern elevation of the house; thence proceed westerly along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the western elevation of the barn ruins; thence proceed southerly along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the southern elevation of the barn ruins; thence proceed easterly along said line to a point formed by its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the eastern elevation of the house; thence proceed northerly to the point of beginning.

#### Boundary Justification:

This boundary includes all the property historically associated with this resource.
