

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7. DESCRIPTION

Located approximately 14 miles southwest of Hazlehurst in the hilly, forested, southwest corner of Copiah County, the Pleasant Valley Methodist Church is a vernacular, frame, gable-front church building constructed circa 1840. The church is situated in a wooded valley and faces east onto Valley Creek, with Pleasant Valley Road running along the south. Behind the church is a cemetery that was established about 1935 and an education building erected in 1956. Huge oak trees, dogwood, and redbud trees grace the property.

Resting on the original sandstone piers, bolstered with additional concrete block piers, the church is a two-by-four bay, gable-front building clad in weatherboards and crowned by a slate roof. The main (east) facade has two bays, each containing double-leaf, one-panel doors topped by a four-light transom. Both side elevations feature four nine-over-nine, double-hung windows framed by wooden louvered blinds. The rear elevation has a small central polygonal apse with novelty siding and two four-over-four, double-hung windows. To the south of the apse is an entrance containing double-leaf, one-panel doors topped by a four-light transom, and to the north of the apse is a nine-over-nine, double-hung window.

The one-room structure has a wooden floor, flush board walls with wide baseboards, beaded board ceiling, original pews, and a dais with altar rail having turned balusters, molded hand rail, and globular finials on the newels. Each of the east doors opens onto an aisle that separates the sanctuary into three sections of pews. The pews in the central section are divided in half by a low wooden wall. According to a member of the congregation, the small apse with segmentally-arched opening was added and a slave gallery that spanned the rear wall was removed more than 70 years ago (Sanders). The removal of the slave gallery may date to the application of the beaded board ceiling around the turn of the century.

To the northwest of the church is Decell Hall, an education building erected in 1956. This building is a one-story, two-by-four bay, frame structure resting on concrete piers and crowned by a gable roof with exposed rafter tails. Behind the church is a cemetery that was established about 1935. Both the education building and cemetery are counted as noncontributing elements.

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8. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built circa 1840, the Pleasant Valley Methodist Church is locally significant for its architectural character (Criterion C), being an excellent example of a vernacular, antebellum, wooden, gable-front church building with two entrances in the gable end. It is one of only two antebellum churches known at this time to survive in Copiah County, the other being the Tabernacle Methodist Church (1857), located approximately six and one-half miles northwest of Hazlehurst on the Dentville Road.

The Registration Requirements for Religious Resources are discussed on pages 67-69 of the MPS cover document entitled "Historic and Architectural Resources of Copiah County, Mississippi." (The associated historic context developed in the MPS cover document and represented by this property is "The Plantation Era in Copiah County, 1823-1865.") The Pleasant Valley Methodist Church was evaluated using the Mississippi Department of Archives and History's guidelines for assessing vernacular churches and was found to be eligible because it is a rare surviving example of an antebellum, gable-front church with two entrances in the gable end and because it displays a high degree of architectural integrity. The building also retains integrity of location, and the setting remains as it was historically—a small clearing located along Valley Creek. The building also retains a high degree of integrity of feeling and association.

Although records are vague as to the exact date of the founding of Pleasant Valley Methodist Church, they indicate that the church was organized sometime between 1830 and 1840, and the present building constructed about 1840 to 1845. One of the more notable events in the church's history was the revival held there in October 1849, which reportedly lasted for 25 days and nights and resulted in the conversion of over 100 souls and the addition of 123 members to the church. The best known layman to come from the church was Major Reuben Webster Millsaps, for whom Millsaps College in Jackson is named. Millsaps received his early religious training in the church, which was located about two miles from his family's home.

Today, the Pleasant Valley Methodist Church has about 50 members, and services are held here the second and fourth Sundays of each month.

10. GEOGRAPHICAL DATA

Verbal Boundary Description: The boundary of the nominated property consists of a rectangle of land with sides that are parallel or perpendicular to the ridge of the roof of the Pleasant Valley Methodist Church. Measuring from the center point of the roof ridge of the church 100 feet north, 400 feet east, 100 feet south, and 200 feet west, the resulting rectangle of land has sides that are 200 feet by 600 feet in length. This property is located in the SE 1/4 Section 12, Township 9 North, Range 6 East.

Boundary Justification: The boundary includes 2.75 acres of the 37.5 acres presently owned by the church. The boundary was selected to include the church, cemetery, education building, and their immediate setting. The boundaries were drawn to take into account the situation of the church near the intersection of Pleasant Valley Road and Sylvarena Road. The nominated acreage reflects the very rural nature of the church's setting and includes land historically associated with the church.
