The Georgian Revival style became popular in Hartford in the first quarter of the 20th century, toward the end of the era of development for Asylum Hill. As Asylum Hill developed from downtown westward, the remaining vacant lots after 1900 were on such streets as Woodland and Forest, near the Little River, the area's western boundary. The Spencer House, located less than a block from Woodland Street, is in this final section to be built up and is in the architectural style that characterized several houses built there in the opening decades of the 20th century.

Perhaps the earliest, and finest, Georgian Revival style house to be built in Asylum Hill is the Cheney House at 40 Noodland Street, 1895, William C. Brocklesby, architect. Its 2-story central portico is imposing and its elaborate details of columns, pilasters and entablatures are carefully designed and well executed. Four houses standing on the east side of Forest Street are later and more representative work. 54 Forest Street, 1923, Russell F. Barker, architect, is similar to the Spencer House with its exterior of red brick and white trim and its interior of pilasters and moldings associated with the Georgian Revival style.

The Spencer House, competently designed and constructed, is no better example than the others of its architectural style, but is outstanding for its date. Constructed in 1929, it is one of the last houses to be built in Asylum Hill and is representtive of the last in the series of architectural styles that were popular in the area. The Spencer Houses was built in the year of Black Friday and the beginning of the Great Depression that marked the end of Asylum Hill's preeminence as the fashionable residential neighborhood for Hartford's leaders.
