Description

The Buffington Hotel is a two story red brick plains commercial style building. The corner location allows for prominent repetition of the architectural detailing along the corner section of the south and east elevations. A corbelled corner pilaster extends above the parapeted roof line. Two second story pilasters with corbelled stops outline the corner section. Window arcading with prominent brick relieving arches are in the entablature between the pilasters. Continuous stone lintels define the eight bays on the south second story elevation and the five bays on the east elevation. Brick toothing extends from the outlining pilasters to the corner pilaster at the north and west ends.

The first floor facade has five round arched bays on the south and three on the east. The respective sets of bays are connected with brick relieving arches. At the southeast corner the Cutaway corner has been filled with plate glass windows. There are three entrances on the south and one on the west. The rear of the building faces an alley and the north side is connected to a single story concrete block building.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Buffington Hotel is significant for its associations with the primary era of growth of Westville that produced its two most substantial commercial building

Westville began as a trade center in 1895. Its location between the military road to Fort Gibson on the north and the stage road, also to Fort Gibson on the south made it an ideal trade center. Its commercial potential was further enhanced when the Kansas City Southern and the Frisco railroads made it a center for freight and passenger service. The railroads also brought cast and crews for the touring vaud-ville troups.

Buffington built the hotel in 1910, just a block from the depots, in response to the need for travelers' lodging. It was managed by Mr. O'Conner until 1929 when O'Conner went to Tulsa to manage the Mecca Hotel (where Negroes hid during the Tulsa race riot).

By the 1930's Westville's spurt of growth was over and there was little need for a hotel. However, it continued to function as a boarding house, a function it still serves now. Along with the Opera House Block, the Buffington Hotel is the most impressive building along Westvilles main commercial street.
