

<u>Unknown Confederate Soldier Monument</u> Hart County, Kentucky

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Description The Unknown Confederate Soldier Monument near Horse Cave is approximately twelve feet tall. It was constructed out of geodes by local craftsman Sam Lively. It is an obelisk with a red marble plaque placed about halfway up the shaft. The plaque reads: "Unknown Soldier C. S. A. Was a member of Gen. Clay Anderson division 11th Louisiana Killed Sept. 9, 1862. Erected 1934 by Sam Lively." It is located just west of SR 335 just south of the I-65 Horse Cave exit.

Statement of Significance The Unknown Confederate Soldier Monument meets National Register criterion A and is significant within the context of "Civil War Monuments in Kentucky, 1861-1935." This homemade monument was one of the later memorials erected within the state. It is an unusual example of the property type obelisk. It is unlike any other monuments created within Kentucky, though it is similar to the Confederate Monument in the Paris Cemetery, in that it was constructed on site with local materials. It is the only monument in the state erected to a single unknown soldier. This monument was erected on private property to honor the remains of a Confederate soldier killed during the Perryville campaign. It is significant because it is a Civil War monument in Kentucky that was built before 1935 has not been severely altered and has not been moved. See registration requirements, pp. F-2 and pp. F-3 of the Multiple Property Documentation Form.

Verbal Boundary Description - The Unknown Confederate Soldier Monument whose boundary forms a circle with a radius of ten feet located just west of SR 335 just south of the Horse Cave exit of I-65.

Verbal Boundary Justification - The area associated with the monument is restricted to the ground on which the monument sits and a small buffer around it. The setting outside such a restricted area is not seen as critically important to maintaining an integrity of association. Because the focus of the multiple property submissions is the significance of the monuments, their proposed area of listing will reflect that they have been considered by-and-large, in isolation from their surrounds.
