DESCRIPTION

The Pioneer Park Bandshell is located on the east end of the park in Brookings, South Dakota. The Pioneer Park is located south of US highway 14 in Brookings between Western Avenue and First Avenue. The construction of the bandshell is concrete which is covered with stucco. The rounded roof over the main stage and the shorter surrounding hipped roof are covered in asphalt shingles. The façade is located on the east elevation of the bandshell and features a quarter-sphere opening for the stage. An arched parapet extends over the stage opening and also hides the round roof behind. Two-story square wings on either side of the stage protrude forward from the parapet slightly, broadening the framing of the stage area.

The north and south sides of the band shell are identical. Doors flanked on each side by enclosed windows are centered on the two-story wings. Recessed rectangular features are centered above the doors and windows. Across the rest of the elevation, which is slightly recessed from the wings, extends a row of enclosed high, short windows. On the north side only, there is a handicap accessible ramp along the side of the structure. On the south side there are stairs.

Symmetrically from left to right across the west elevation are two short enclosed windows, an arcaded gallery with five arches that houses the restrooms, and two more short enclosed windows. The architecture of the bandshell is Art Deco which is carried through by the geometric musical motifs that are present at each side of the stage as well as the apex of the arched opening.

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SIGNIFICANCE

The Pioneer Park Bandshell is significant under criterion A for its association with economics, social history and entertainment/recreation of Brookings during the Great Depression. The bandshell is also eligible under criterion C as an example of the type of resources constructed in parks across South Dakota during the 1930's and 1940's as well as the distinctive construction method. As a federal relief project, the bandshell is significant because it is associated with federal programs designed to provide work for unemployed segments of the population and to supplement the depressed economy of many rural communities. This particular bandshell is of the Art Deco style and was built in 1936 with the assistance of the Works Progress Administration. This is typical of the majority of the bandshells built during this time period.

The park system in Brookings started in 1924 after the City of Brookings purchased the land currently occupied by Pioneer Park and initiated plans to develop the parcel into a city park. Prior to the purchase by the city, the Brookings county fair was held at the location from 1907 to 1922. The city acquired the property in 1923 for a total of \$10,000.¹

In June of 1924 the Park Board retained Mr. Charles Ramsdell, a Minneapolis landscape architect, to design Pioneer Park, formally known as West Park and City Park, for a fee of \$300. Mr. Ramsdell provided a site plan and specifications for construction of the park. In general, the park was constructed according to the site plan, including the road, landscaping, and nominated bandshell.²

Nearly a decade after the park was designed, the bandshell was finally constructed. The structure was designed by Lincoln, NE architect Albert Pugsley, a former resident of Brookings. The WPA assisted with construction of the bandshell. The development of the park was the impetus that resulted in the establishment of the Brookings Park Board in 1924.³

1929 marked the beginning of the Great Depression with the stock market crash followed by mass unemployment and failed banks. South Dakota was no different, but what added to depression was the farm values shrank as well as the decline in farm income. Between 1920 and 1930 23,000 farms had been foreclosed and 71 percent of the state's banks had failed. In addition to these economic woes, the Great Plains endured droughts, dust storms, grasshopper plagues and severe winters. Any form of relief was going to have to come from the assistance of the federal government.⁴

The WPA was a massive employment relief program started in 1935 under President

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Roosevelt's second New Deal. Harry L. Hopkins was appointed chief administrator of the program. The two qualifications for employment were need (means-test) and employability (health and physical fitness). The wages and hours for WPA workers were set up as a fixed monthly "security" or subsistence wage for between 120 and 140 hours per month. Workers were paid even if time was lost due to factors beyond their control. The philosophy of the program was to 'put the unemployed back to work in jobs which would serve the public good and conserve the skills and the self esteem of workers throughout the US. In South Dakota alone, the WPA provided employment to an average of 15,000 people monthly; this included over 2,000 women and over 12,000 men. From 1935 to 1939, and about \$80,000,000 was expended through work projects. The WPA in South Dakota was divided into five district administrative units with offices in Aberdeen, Watertown, Sioux Falls, Pierre and Rapid City. The state administrator was M.A. Kennedy. The Pioneer Park Bandshell is a physical reminder of the unprecedented use of government aid to construct community improvements and help the depressed local economy.

Construction projects made up the bulk of the work, and were under the direction of the Division of Engineering and Construction. Recreational buildings such as bandshells were built under the third category, the Public Buildings Projects. Certain architectural features and the use of particular materials developed from the program and the WPA followed the newer tendencies of simplification of architectural style, as simplicity was best suited for the workers with limited skills. The result of this was the construction of public buildings in regional variations of Art Deco and Art Moderne styles. Concrete was the most widely used material, however other materials native to the region were also used.⁸

During the great depression of the 1930's, many construction and improvement projects for parks, campgrounds and picnic grounds across South Dakota were undertaken as part of the Civilian Conservation Corps and Works Progress Administration federal relief programs. While most park resources such a picnic shelters, recreation buildings and bridges utilized rustic architecture, other projects were less rustic and more closely related to the Art Deco and Modern styles. Bandshells in particular followed this practice. They were generally of concrete construction with a quarter-sphere shape to not only cover the band from the elements, but also direct the sound towards the audience. The Pioneer Park Bandshell reflects this type of construction.⁹

The Art Deco style is characterized by smooth wall surfaces usually of stucco. Zigzag chevrons or other stylized geometric motifs were used as decorative elements at the apex of

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the arch and on the sides of the stage to give a vertical emphasis. These style elements characterize the Pioneer Park Bandshell.¹⁰

The bandshell is also locally significant in the areas of recreation and entertainment for its contribution to the community at large, which continues today. As with all WPA, CWA and PWA projects, the bandshell was public property intended to enhance the social and recreational activities in Brookings and the surrounding area.

Within the context of the Multiple Property Listing (MPL) "Federal Relief Construction in South Dakota 1929-1941", the bandshell is notable as an individual property type (parks, Campgrounds and Picnic Grounds) under the category of Social and Recreational Facilities. The MPL states that in addition to social history and economics, the bandshell is significant in the area of entertainment/recreation and architecture.

The Pioneer Park Bandshell meets all the registration requirements stipulated in the associated Multiple Property Listing in that it was financed in part by the federal government through the Works progress Administration; it was completed prior to 1941. It is locally significant and it retains its historic integrity. It is therefore eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under criteria A and C.

The boundaries of the Pioneer Park Bandshell include the area just immediately surrounding the bandshell. The boundary is an imaginary line that forms a rectangle encompassing the bandshell. The rectangle is an extended 10 feet around the perimeter of the actual structure.
