

This house, while having been altered through the years, still retains . sufficient amount of its original fabric that it should be recognized and retained. We are therefore including it for its architectural significance, for its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County area, and for its remaining historic fabric. As such it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey

The property is still in use for agricultural purposes, making it a rare survivor in Bergen County. Its growth over the years contrasts with the more pristine Isaac Naugle House nearby (#8).
