#### 7. Description

The Blue Swallow Motel consists of two one-story buildings. The motel portion has a metal shed roof, pink stucco walls over hollow tile bricks, and a concrete foundation. The spatial organization of the property includes the L-plan of the fourteenunit motel and a discreet office and manager's residence, parts of which formerly served as a gas station, and a playground located within the grounds framed by the motel. The motel building's facade reflects a modest use of the Southwest Vernacular Style with its pink stucco walls decorated with shell designs and a stepped parapet. Garage units, some with wood overhead doors, are located between the sleeping units. Several of the metal casement windows and single panel wood doors have metal awnings.

The office and manager's residence has a flat asphalt roof with a wide overhang and large fixed windows in the front. Metal casement and aluminum sliding windows are located along side and rear walls as are two wood frame doors with large upper lights. The front door is a multi-light wood frame door.

The motel and office/residence front on what was Route 66, offering access to motorists both from the highway and from a side street. When the highway was widened to four lanes in 1951, the new sidewalk reached the motel's sign post. Much of the signage dates to the 1950s and includes a large vertical sign that rests on the office roof and extends to a post support, forming an arch canopy under which prospective clients can park. The parapet of the motel is outlined in neon with blue neon swallows periodically placed along the facade. The motel has had only a few minor alterations.

### 8. Statement of Significance

The Blue Swallow Motel is one of the best examples of a largely unaltered pre-war tourist court remaining along Route 66

in New Mexico. It was begun prior to the outbreak of World War II and completed in early 1942. W.A. Huggins, a Tucumcari carpenter constructed the building for Ted Jones, a prominent eastern New Mexican rancher. When he and his wife died in a plane crash in the 1950s, Lillian Redman bought the motel and has owned and operated it since. The motel has been closely identified with Route 66 in several books and articles, and the motel and its owner have emerged as icons of Route 66 folklore. Because of this close association with early automobile tourism along Route 66, the property is eligible under Criterion A. The property also qualifies under Criterion C for the way in which its setting, location, design and materials reflect early tourist court construction in New Mexico. In particular, the garages, the spatial arrangement of the motel, office/residential and playground elements, and the continued use of early signage convey the historic significance of the property.
