DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Demopolis Post Office is a one-story brick building with full basement, containing 7,084 interior square feet. It is located on a 20,700 square foot rectangular shaped site fronting on West Capitol Street and running northerly on Walnut Street.

The exterior of the building is red brick laid in a Flemish Bond style. The front part of the roof is hipped and covered with galvanized metal. The back part is flat and built up. The roof is trimmed with a wood balustrade that sits atop a wooden cornice with dentils, a brick rectangular stack with a concrete cap, stone coping and galvanized metal louvers are on top of the roof at the back.

The front consists of a recessed double glass front entrance door with a tripart window on each side. The door is wood trimmed with multiple transom panels — directly over the door trim is a four-light transom and above that a fanlight transom. A brick hoodmold in a soldier course with stone keys at the spring lines and crown is arched over the recessed fanlight. The tripart windows on each side of the front entrance are recessed in an arched opening with 12/12 wood sash lights with a fanlight transom. They have the same hoodmold trim surrounding them. Directly above the keystone, a single soldier course adds distinction to the design of the building as it contrasts with the Flemish Bond.

The other windows in arched openings, two front and back and three on each side, are 9/9 lights double hung wood sash. These windows have segmental brick arches laid in alternating rowlock and soldier courses with keystone at the crown. All the windows mentioned have decorated stone lug sills which flow into the stone water table. There are three other windows in the back -- two over the back platform are single hung, wood sash with 12 lights and the other is a tripart with 6/18/6 wood sash lights with a transom of 8 lights and blind panel.

The concrete steps at the front entrance are flanked by wrought iron lamp posts on each side where the iron hand railings begin upward toward the front entrance.

The lobby area has terrazzo flooring with marble base and border, wood wainscot, and plaster walls, ceiling and cornice.

The Postmaster's office has wood flooring base, chair rail and picture mold trim with plaster walls and ceilings.

The workroom area has a plank tile floor, wood wainscot and plaster walls and ceiling.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The first official post office to serve any part of the present city of Demopolis was designated Aigleville (Eagleville), the village of French emigrants. It was located on the southeastern edge of Dempolis. The office was extremely short lived, existing only from December 22, 1817 to January 16, 1818. The Postmaster was William Tabele. The post office reopened December 24, 1819, and has been operational since.

The construction of the present post office building was awarded to A. Anderson & Company of St. Louis, MO in 1910 and was completed in 1912. During this time, the design and construction of the post offices were the responsibility of the Treasury Department. The designs for large projects were produced by private architects, but most smaller buildings were designed within the Supervising Architect's office. Demopolis' post office fell into this last category of smaller buildings. Franklin MacVeagh was the Secretary of the Treasury and James Knox Taylor, the Supervising Architect.

As far as design was concerned, Taylor's policy was that the design of government buildings should express classical and democratic ideals and symbolize power, organization and institutionalization. His stylistic elements of design were drawn from the French Beaux-Arts, Neoclassical and Colonial Revival. Taylor also believed that federal buildings must be built to last and so must be of high quality materials and construction. His feelings were that these small post office buildings, which were generally the most important local building, provided the local citizens an opportunity to feel the influence of the great architectural works.

The Demopolis post office building is 70 years old and is still in very good condition. Its architectural features and age warrant preservation. The City of Demopolis itself is historical. It presently contains various sites listed on the National Register. In fact, the City Hall (Confederate Square) which one time served as the post office and the Old Presbyterian Church are directly across the street from the post office and are listed on the National Register.

The women's toilet has a terrazzo floor with marble base, wainscot border and plaster walls and ceilings.

The men's toilet has a tile floor with marble border and wainscot and plaster walls and ceilings.

The swingroom has a cement floor with wood base and chair rail, plaster walls and ceiling.


The basement area has a mixture of tile and concrete blooring, drop tile and concrete ceiling and brick walls.

Recessed flourescent lighting is in the lobby area and stem-mounted flourescent lighting on the workroom floor.

Since construction of this facility, the following alterations and repairs have been made:

- 1956 Workroom floor covered with plank tile.
- 1961 Driveway extension and repairs.
- 1962 Heating changed from coal to gas.
- 1964 New mailing platform and building modification.
- 1974 Roof repairs.
- 1975 New front doors and frames.
- 1976 Enclosure of platform
- 1982 Building repairs.
