Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Old China Trail is a packed dirt trail located on a southeast facing ridge of China Mountain in the Warren Mining District of central Idaho. The trail originates at the Celadon Slope Garden and descends 440 feet in one and one half miles to the Ah Toy Garden. The trail is approximately one meter wide and was produced by Chinese gardeners as an access between three related terraced garden sites above the South Fork of the Salmon River. The Old China Trail possesses qualities of location, setting, and association deemed necessary for properties of this type to be listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

The Old China Trail originates at the Celadon Slope Garden and descends a southeast facing ridge to the Chi-Sandra Garden. The trail runs along the upper edge of the Chi-Sandra Garden, then follows a slope above the north side of China Creek to the Ah Toy Garden where it terminates. The trail follows topographic features, taking advantage of any level or clear areas on the steep slopes of China Mountain.

The Old China Trail is overgrown in some areas. Payette National Forest crews cleared parts of the trail in 1988 to provide access to the Ah Toy Occupation excavation. The Chinese gardeners of China Mountain packed produce from the upper Celadon Slope Garden to the town of Warren, 9 miles away. It is expected that portions of the Old China Trail exist in the area between China Mountain and Warren but no evidence of the trail has yet been located.

The Old China Trail was not formally constructed, but was worn into the slopes of China Mountain by continual use. Recent usage has caused the trail to deepen, but has also prevented encroaching vegetation from obscuring the trail.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Old China Trial is significant under Criterion A, as part of the history of overseas Chinese on the Idaho Mining Frontier. The Old China Trail is part of a complex of Chinese sites on China Mountain in the Warren Mining District. These sites were occupied between 1870 to 1920. The Old China Trail was the primary access between the terraced gardens sites. These gardens were a commercial operation to supply fresh produce to the town of Warren. The Old China Trail was vital to the Chinese gardeners of China Mountain. Without the trail, gardeners could not transport their crops to the market. The Old China Trail was a crucial component of the commercial garden system.

Chinese gardeners were the only residents of China Mountain until 1902. The Old China Trail, as known today, originates at the Celadon Slope Garden and descends to the Chi-Sandra Garden, before it follows China Creek to the Ah Toy Garden. The Ah Toy Garden is the terminus of the Old China Trail.

There was no Euro-American traffic in the area until the early 20th century. At that time, a wagon road to Warren was constructed from China Mountain, possibly over a trail established by the Chinese.

The only portion of the Old China Trail currently identified exists on China Mountain and connects the three Chinese Terrace Gardens. The Old China Trail was informally constructed, and follows along topographic features. The route of the Old China Trail substantiates claims that it was used primarily to access the China Mountain Terraced Gardens.

The Old China Trail as identified in this submission extends one and a half miles. It is probable that other portions of the trail exist to the northwest, toward Warren. The Chinese gardeners of China Mountain packed produce 9 miles in this direction. No other segments of the Old
