The Guild-Verner House is a <u>two-story brick</u> structure with a <u>gabled</u> roof, <u>two end-exterior</u> chimneys and one interior chimney located on the rear of the east wing. The red brick set in common bond has been twice <u>stuccoed over</u>; the first coat was a pinkish hue, while the second and present coat is beige.

Numerous additions to the house presently obsure its original Georgian simplicity. The five-bay facade has simple double hung windows with flat arches, now stuccoed over, located two on either side of the central entrance which has a segmented arch and side lites. This pattern is repeated on the second floor where a central door with transom and side lites gives access to a balcony, supported by large ornate wooden brackets. The portico, a 1900's addition, consists of four Ionic columns on square piers, supporting a flat portico roof. Two pilasters at either end are also raised on piers. A single dormer window projects out onto the portico roof.

A side, or <u>east portico</u>, also a 1900's addition has two small pairs of matching Ionic columns each resting on a pier. A room has been added above this portico.

The main block of the house is rectangular with two rooms, each with a matching mantel, and a central hall. The gabled roof of this section of the house has wide overhangs. A three-room ell on the west also has a gabled roof, two windows and a door on the first floor and three windows on the second floor. The windows and door have flat brick arches, stuccoed over.

A <u>one-room ell</u> on the east also has a gabled roof, and a bay window. The central hall extends the length of this room and a double run stair, now gutted by fire, rose to the second floor. Additions to the rear of the building are of wood, and consist of several rooms and a garage.

The Guild-Verner House is the <u>oldest brick</u> residence still standing in the county of Tuscaloosa and has <u>served</u> as the residence of several prominent Tuscaloosans. Construction was completed in 1822 by Dr. James Guild, the year following his arrival in Tuscaloosa. Guild was a prominent West Alabama doctor, who later became nationally known as a surgeon, and was one of the few early doctors of Tuscaloosa to study medicine at a college, having received his Doctor of Medicine degree from Transylvania.

Additionally he contributed to the early development of Tuscaloosa and Alabama serving as a trustee at the University of Alabama and the Alabama Insane Hospital, and also as a member of both the State Senate and the Alabama House of Representatives from Tuscaloosa County. His son, Lafayette Guild, who was born and spent his boyhood years in this Tuscaloosa landmark, later became a doctor and served as chief medical officer on Robert E. Lee's staff.

In 1881 Dr. Guild sold the house to Henry Snow who in turn sold it to Dr. Charles Snow. The Snows had moved to Tuscaloosa in the 1820's.

A daughter of Dr. Charles Snow, Julia Penn, married Dr. W.G.B. Pearson, and they also lived here. Dr. Pearson was born in North Carolina and moved to Tuscaloosa in 1858 where he was a druggist and served a term in the State House of Representatives.

The Pearson family sold this landmark home to another important early Tuscaloosa County family in 1911, Mr. C.B. Verner. Verner was a lawyer, a solicitor of Circuit Court, a member of the House of Representatives, and a Land Commissioner for the University of Alabama. He was also President of the Merchant's Bank and Trust Company and a member of the Tuscaloosa City Board of Education. Later he was appointed U.S. Assistant Attorney General. Subsequently the house has been used as an office for an insurance company, a funeral home and most recently, as a restaurant. At present it is vacant.

Tentative plans call for restoration of this early landmark by the Tuscaloosa County Commission in cooperation with the Tuscaloosa County Preservation Society.
