Narrative Description

SUMMARY

The Angulo-Hostetter House is a one-story wood frame building covered in stucco and located in the City of Mesa, Maricopa County, Arizona. This house was built in 1902 with an addition constructed in 1938. It remains in good condition and has undergone only minor alterations. The home retains a high degree of architectural integrity. This Colonial Revival house exhibits some Queen Anne features and is currently situated in the original town center of Mesa. In 1995, it was moved from its original location to the Wilbur Street Historic District to save it from demolition.

DESCRIPTION

The Angulo-Hostetter House is a one-story building with an attic. The dimensions of this rectangular building are 35 feet by 30 feet. The new, raised foundation is constructed of concrete and stone and the house has a crawl space beneath it.

It is a wood frame building that was stuccoed around 1938. The unusual gable-on-hip roof is covered in asphalt shingles and has a shed-roof dormer in the front. The gable ends and the dormer have scalloped wood shingle cladding. The kitchen and bathroom addition have a tin roof as does the 10 foot by 30 foot open, full-front porch, which is supported by four turned-spindle posts. The porch has a shed roof, the ceiling is beadboard and the floor is made of wood.

The windows are plain, 1/1, double-hung wood sash. The two front windows have leaded glass at the top. Each of the bedrooms has two double-hung windows. The front entrance is a centrally located wood door with a large window and a flat, single-light transom window and plain, flat trim surrounding it. There is a pair of French doors on the north side of the main room. In the kitchen, there is one hinged window facing west and a window over the sink facing north. The bathroom has a large, single-pane window which faces west.

The original floor plan consisted of three (3) rooms: two bedrooms and a main room. Around 1938, a kitchen and bathroom were added at the rear of the house but are not visible from the street. The addition does not substantially change the massing of the house. The interior, plastered walls of the original house are ten feet high and the ceiling in the main room is coved. There is six-inch wood molding around all doors and windows and eight-inch base boards throughout. The floors inside the house are made of wood.

In the 1938 addition are eight-foot high walls plastered in the same fashion as the original structure. There is one main room, two bedrooms and an attic on the main portion of the house, and a kitchen and a bathroom in the addition. The main room had a colonnade divider that was removed in 1938.

In 1995, the Angulo-Hostetter House was moved by the city of Mesa to save it from demolition. In its current location, it is surrounded by later period revival homes, as it was originally. Set back from the street, the house has a front lawn and central walk up to the porch. Flowers and plants are planted on either side of the house, contributing to the pleasant suburban atmosphere.

Statement of Significance

The Angulo-Hostetter House, constructed in 1902, is significant under National Register Criterion C as a rare example of a wood frame, Colonial Revival house with Queen Anne elements in Mesa. In fact, this piece of transitional architecture is the oldest surviving wood frame Colonial Revival in the city. Although it has been stuccoed, this is a historic modification and the massing and Queen Anne elements remain visible. The house was constructed in 1902, the same year that the Reclamation Act was passed, allowing valley farmers to organize and begin construction of the Roosevelt Dam in 1906. Mesa continued to grow following the construction of the dam from 722 people in 1902 to more than 360,000 people today.

Historic Context

Mesa is located in the Eastern Salt River Valley in present day Maricopa County. For many centuries, the land was home to the Hohokam Indians who used the Salt River to irrigate their crops. The Hohokam mysteriously vanished in the fifteenth century. Following the American Civil War, the population in the Salt River Valley began to grow, and the old canals of the Hohokam were used once again to irrigate crops.

In 1875, a Mormon expedition came south from Salt Lake City, Utah and settled in the Valley. Two years later, at the urging of Brigham Young, the leader of the Church of Latter Day Saints (Mormons), the Lehi Company also settled in the east valley. A year later, in 1878, the Mesa Company followed.

The Mesa Company established their settlement 5 miles east of Lehi, the town founded by the Lehi Company. On July 12, 1878, Theodore Sirrine filed for possession of Section 22, the area now known as Town Center. The town site was laid out according to the instructions the first leader of the Mormons, Joseph Smith, had declared for all Mormon settlements. The Section was divided into 10 acre plots, with wide streets measuring 132 feet across.

The high quality soil, irrigated by the Salt River, allowed the settlement to flourish. Within 10 years, the town had 300 residents and officially took the name of Mesa. Many of these new residents were non-Mormons. In 1891, gold was discovered in the Superstition Mountains to the east of the town. Over the next six (6) years, the mine produced over \$1 million in gold. In 1895, a branch line of the railroad was

constructed, bringing refined goods such as windows, furnishings and tools. Mesa served as the supply stop for miners heading into the mountains since it was the eastern-most town in the Valley. With the passage of the Reclamation Act in 1902, farmers in the valley organized to construct the Roosevelt Dam, making the valley a safer, more prosperous farming community. Construction of the dam was completed in 1911.

As Mesa grew and changed, so did its architecture. No longer merely a Mormon settlement, by the turn-of-the-century, Mesa had a variety of residents. From Mormon settlers to aspiring businessmen to the growing number of farmers, Mesa's architecture reflected this change. The arrival of the railroad in 1895 brought goods such as double-hung windows, leaded glass, tongue-and-groove wood, and turned posts.² The Angulo-Hostetter house exhibits all these features. It is transitional in both type and style. The form of the house is Colonial Revival with the hipped roof, full-width recessed porch, symmetrical façade, and the massing of the original portion of the house. It has Queen Anne elements such as turned posts, a dominant front porch, and shingles on the dormer and gable ends. This modest house survives as the only wood frame Colonial Revival house in Mesa.

History of the Angulo-Hostetter House

The original owner of the house, Cornelio Elías Angulo, was born in Tucson to Mercedes Elías, of the well-known Tucson pioneer family. His father immigrated to Tucson from Sonora, Mexico and ran a successful meat market in Tucson for many years. One of Cornelio's brothers, Gabriel Angulo, was a well-known cattle rancher and owned the Santa Lucia Ranch in Tucson. One of his sisters married F.B. Maldonado, and another married A.W. Townsend, both very prominent businessmen in Mesa.

Cornelio was the first owner of the Angulo-Hostetter House and one of the most popular sales clerks at the Toggery at the Town Center Department Store, according to the *Mesa Tribune*. C.E. Angulo was the head of men's clothing and hats at the Town Center. Angulo represents the new immigrants to the community that were not part of its Mormon origins.

In 1917, Angulo sold the house to Chester Hostetter, who moved in with his wife and four children. Hostetter was born in Wisconsin, moved to Colorado and finally to Mesa. Raised on a ranch, Hostetter was a gardener by trade. In 1918, Hostetter lost his 12-year-old son and his wife in the influenza epidemic within two weeks of one another.

On April 2, 1919, Mr. Hostetter purchased the Palace of Sweets, located on Main Street. He sold confections, ice cream and summer drinks until he moved to Long Beach, California in 1936, when he sold his home to his nephew, Edd Gardner for \$2,700. Edd Gardner was a stucco and plaster worker and renovated the house and built an addition in 1938.

In 1995, the house was moved by the City of Mesa to the Wilbur neighborhood to protect it from demolition. Although the house has been moved it still has an "orientation, setting, and general environment similar to those of the historic location . . . that are compatible with the property's significance." The Angulo-Hostetter House maintains integrity of materials, workmanship, feeling, and association. It is a rare, intact example of a wood-frame Colonial Revival house with Queen Anne elements and a significant part of the architecture of turn-of-the-century Mesa, Arizona.


