

This house, while having been altered through the years, still retains a sufficient amount of its original fabric that it should be recognized and revained. We are therefore including it for its problectural significance, for its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County area, and for its remaining historic fabric. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Mistoric Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey,





Harvey says: Martin Powlesen and Hendrick Brinkerhoff were granted tracts in 1676 in "New Hackensack" and these tracts were probably closely adjoining near this house. Van Valsen says: Richard (Dirk) Paulison was a descendant born October 1, 1773 and lived here almost 100 years until 1873. His son Powles, or Paul, continued on here and owned land as far north as Hackensack Avenue (into the old Brinkerhoff land - CKT). He died in 1832 and specified that the property be sold and divided twelve years after his death between his sons. David Christie, who had married Anna Brinkerhoff and settled in English Neighborhood in 1835 and died in 1848, bought the farm at the division sale in 1844 for his son Albert Brinkerhoff Christie. Louise H. Burnett says he had nine children and lived here until his death in 1888. His wife was Lydia Ann Christie (not related) and his son Cornelius, who was born here in 1864, was a telegraph operator, train dispatcher and train master.
