Narrative Description

Name of Property

Fillius Park is located 25 miles west of Denver along State Highway 74. This 105 acre park was once the ranch of J.J. Clark, who raised cattle and owned a meat market in Central City, Colorado. The park offers an excellent recreation site consisting of gentle slopes with well placed pine and spruce trees throughout.

This popular park consists of a stone shelter house and a small pump house, designed by Jacques Jules Benoit Benedict. Fireplaces and picnic areas are scattered throughout the park in addition to a volleyball area, horseshoe pits and modern latrines. Several species of wildflowers are interspersed throughout the rock outcroppings.

The unique rectangular stone shelter house, which is still very much intact, displays open wickerwork under the asphalt-shingled roof. Built by the City and County of Denver in 1918, the shelter contains a large stone fireplace, four small distinctive round windows on either end, and two large arched portals flanking the entrance.

The pump house, also built by the City and County of Denver in 1918 of native stone and timber, was available in the park for refilling early automobile radiators. The conical roof constructed of asphalt shingles is supported by four stone piers on a concrete foundation. It is now used as a small picnic shelter.

Two existing structures are contributing.

Three rectangular outhouses designed by the WPA are located on the site. The structural framework of peeled logs is covered with vertical wooded slats. The foundations are concrete. Available documentation does not determine the date of construction or the builder, therefore, we are considering these three structures as non-contributing.

Narrative Statement of Significance

Fillius Park meets criterion A for its historic significance to Entertainment and Recreation. Conservation, and Community Planning and Development and meets criterion for C for the architectural significance of its structures and Landscape Architecture. The park meets the registration requirements as they are defined in the Multiple Property Documentation Form for the Denver Mountain Parks. The park is a significant part of the Denver Mountain Park System as it was recommended for purchase in Olmsted Jr.'s Plan and represents all of Olmsted's requirements for land parcels to be purchased as Denver Mountain Parks:

Fillius Park is easily accessible by automobile.
Fillius Park has gently sloping lands which provide excellent areas for peaceful and relaxing mountain recreation with large ponderosa trees which offer natural shade and comfort for park visitors.
Fillius Park provides a large open space in the surrounding community.

The significance of Fillius Park is important to entertainment and recreation as it was considered one of the picnic parks of the hills. It was and continues to be used by large groups. The park also provides scenic vistas along the parkway system.

Fillius Park is significant to Landscape Architecture as part of the Olmsted Brother's acquisition plan. The design of the park includes rock outcrops and large, mature trees throughout. It is consistent with other mountain parks in that it provided parking areas adjacent to individual picnic sites, therefore, conserving the remaining acreage for passive recreation of visual resources which contributes to the preservation of the area's natural and environmental resources. The hillside flattens out on top and is covered with open timber. Fillius Park represents significance for architecture because the intact park buildings, the shelter and pump house, were designed by prominent architect, J. J. B. Benedict and constructed by the CCC.

The park is also significant to Community Planning and Development in that it is an extension to the City Beautiful Movement and provides open space to the metro Denver area. Seventy acres of the park was originally donated by cattle rancher J.J. Clark to the Denver City and County Mountain Park System; the rest was acquired through condemnation. The park was named for Jacob Fillius, a member of the Denver Park Board who died in 1940 and, like many other city officials, was given the title "Father of the Mountain Parks System."

Fillius Park was recommended for purchase by Frederick Law Olmsted, Jr. as part of the mountain park system in his land acquisition plan. Even before the site was acquired in 1918 the park was a popular area. Known as one of the picnic parks of the hills, Fillius Park was frequented by family groups. It was the goal of park authorities to make the mountain parks accessible to all to visit and enjoy. The system not only provided an unique opportunity for visitors to Denver but also for the children of the "mile high city" of all backgrounds to experience the mountains. Overnight outings in the mountain were popular among both hove and girls groups. popular among both boys and girls groups.

The period of significance is arbitrarily ended at 1944 to meet the National Register's age criteria.


