DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The English Tudor style Hazelden home of the late George Ade, author, humorist, and playwright, was built in 1904 (Billy Mann, Chicago, was architect). The many-gabled two story frame and plaster structure contains 14 rooms, three complete bathrooms and two half-baths. The house features leaded-glass windows, beamed and vaulted ceilings.

The front door opens into a large foyer dominated by a solid oak open stairway -- its stairwell extending to the top ceiling of the second floor. Leading off either side of the foyer are large openings; one into a spacious living room, the other into the dining room. Two huge brick fireplaces compliment each other on either end of the massive rooms. Brick chimneys of these fireplaces extend through the ceilings of both rooms. A built-in-glass-enclosed book case lines one entire wall of the living room. A built-in sideboard (buffet) extends along a wall in the dining room. There are many brass candelabra walltype light fixtures. Other light fixtures are in keeping with the home of that era. All first-floor woodwork is solid mission finish oak.

Mr. Ade's Study is located off from the dining room. It is completely intact as he left it, including furniture and objets d' art.

Three second floor rooms (formerly bedrooms) have been converted into museum rooms. These rooms contain much of Ade memorabilia, including an almost complete set of Ade books, plays. Numerous photographs and some original manuscripts are housed here. All are displayed in glass cases.

Alterations in the restoration include an apartment for a caretaker (3 rooms), second floor west; living room, bedroom, and kitchen -- these were formerly bedrooms. Two porches east (first and second floor), formerly screened, are now glassed-in and heated so they can be used during winter months.

Other buildings still existing on the estate grounds include a two-story carriage house with chauffeur's quarters and a large well house.

The home has been almost completely restored authentically at a cost of more than \$50,000.00 -- all by public donation.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

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When George Ade moved in to his newly-built Hazelden Home in 1904, he continued playwriting--first written in his new home was <u>The College Widow</u> (this play grossed for him over two million dollars at the box office before going to stock companies). This was followed by <u>Sho-Gun</u>, the same year. Ade continued writing his plays, books, and magazine articles through the next several years to amass a fortune.

Ade, the party-giver, entertained the high and the mighty and also the not so mighty. Theodore Roosevelt, William Howard Taft, and Calvin Coolidge stayed at the house, as did Gene Tunney, James Whitcomb Riley, Booth Tarkington, Will Rogers, Damon Runyon, John T. McCutcheon, Kenesaw Mountain Landis, Ernie Pyle, Franklin P. Adams, and Douglas MacArthur (then a Lt. Col.), to name a few.

"The House Where Laughter Dwelt," had its serious moments too. In 1908, William Howard Taft launched his successful campaign for the 27th President of the United States. More than 20,000 people attended the rally at Hazelden Farm. Many political parties were held at Hazelden. Vice-President Charles Dawes was principal speaker there in 1924. Ade was in the national political background during most of his active life.

Sigma Chi held picnics; Indiana Society of Chicago (founded by George Ade and John T. McCutcheon in 1905) held frequent dinner parties. The annual summer Children's Picnics were much sought-after invitationals. National Golf Maches on Ade's own golf course for the benefit of the American Red Cross were great events of consequence.

In June, 1941, a meeting was held in George Ade's Study to establish a national organization of the friends of Mark Twain.

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

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
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GEORGE ADE'S HAZELDEN HOME SITE



Legal Description of George Ade Residence Property:

A part of the West Half (W_2) of Section Twenty-two (22), Township Twenty-eight (28) North, Range Eight (8) West of the Second Principal Meridian, in Newton County, Indiana, described as follows, to-wit: Commencing at a point 651.5 feet South and 996.5 feet East of the Northwest corner of said Section 22, running thence south a distance of 165 feet, more or less; thence west a distance of 260 feet, more or less; thence north a distance of 165 feet, more or less; thence east a distance of 260 feet, more or less to the place of beginning, containing 1 acre, more or less.
