Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Lewiston Commercial District Multiple Resource Area consists of scattered commercial buildings located in the city's central business district. The areas included are Lisbon Street and Park Street north of Maple Street, Main Street between Lisbon and Bates Streets, and Park, Middle and Bates Streets between Oak and Main Street. As the principal shopping district of the city, the area maintains an historic cohesiveness consisting almost entirely of commercial establishments dating from the middle of the nineteenth century to the present. The surrounding areas consist primarily of mixtures of residential, industrial and religious buildings.

Interspersed among the nominated properties are numerous buildings which have been determined not to be eligible for inclusion in this nomination. These structures either do not possess sufficient architectural integrity or were constructed within the past fifty years. A survey conducted in June-August, 1984, by a professional architectural historian provided the documentation to determine the eligibility of the properties. In addition, the multiple resource area also includes three individuallylisted buildings and a historic district that are already listed or are pending approval for listing in the National Register (see list, below).

The Lewiston Commercial District Multiple Resource Area includes multi-story commercial buildings of masonry construction which vary in age from circa 1855-1914 The heights of the buildings range from two to seven stories, and the styles vary from Greek Revival to Italianate, Second Empire, Romanesque, and Renaissance Revival. Fifteen structures are being nominated. No known archaeological resources exist in this district.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Lewiston Commercial District Multiple Resource Area is historically significant as the principal commercial district of Lewiston, the largest industrial center in Maine. Moreover, the buildings in the nominated area include the work of all of the city's leading nineteenth century architects. Architectural firms such as Charles F. Douglas, Stevens & Coombs, Jefferson L. Coburn & Sons, Miller & Mayo, and Coombs, Gibbs, & Wilkinson dominated their profession throughout the region for which Lewiston was the industrial center.

The development of this district as a retail area coincided with the growth of the city's textile industry, which accelerated under the auspices of the Lewiston Water Power Company (later re-organized as the Franklin Company). Financed principally by Boston capitalists, the Franklin Company layed out the city into building lots, directing where various types of development could occur. Lisbon Street, located between the mills and the public park, became the principal location for commercial enterprises.

In 1850 Lewiston's population was 5,000. By 1910 it had grown to over 26,000 with 70% of the workforce employed in the mills. In the context of this thriving industrial development, Lisbon Street grew as a business district to meet the needs of the growing population. In addition to stores and offices, the buildings on the street often included meeting halls for public and private gatherings. The College Block (246-274 Lisbon Street) and the Odd Fellows Block (182-190 Lisbon Street) also had upper story halls. Among the numerous businesses located on the street, the foremost was Peck's Department Store (184 Main Street), a massive four-story building sited at the head of Lisbon Street. Both historically and architecturally, this 1898-99 structure is the most important department store ever constructed in Maine.

The variety of sizes, styles and ornamentation on the nominated properties reflect various phases of economic growth from the pre-Civil War years to World War I. The year 1914, the date of the most recent structure in this nomination, marks the high water mark of Lewiston's prosperity. Very little construction has occurred since that date, except for extensive alterations to existing structures that has characterized modernization efforts of the past twenty years.

Architecturally, the area is significant for its variety of brick and stone buildings, many of them designed by regionally important architects. The College Block, 246-274 Lisbon Street (c. 1855/c. 1865) and the Lord Produce Store, 379 Lisbon Street (c. 1865) represent the earliest types of structures and are late vernacular interpretations of the Greek Revival style. By the 1870's, architectural fashions more closely reflected sophisticated national trends. The Union Block, 21-23 Lisbon Street (1870), Lyceum Hall, 49-51 Lisbon Street (1872, Charles F. Douglas, architect), and the Odd Fellows Block, 182-190 Lisbon Street (1876, Stevens & Coombs, architects) were designed showing influences of the popular Italianate, Second Empire and High Victorian Gothic modes.

Eclectic styles of the last quarter of the nineteenth century include the McGillicuddy Block, 137 Lisbon Street, with its distinctive tower (1895, Jefferson L. Coburn & Sons, architects), and the Osgood Building, 129–133 Lisbon Street, with its locally rare use of glazed white face brick (1893, Jefferson L. Coburn & Sons, architects). Sophisticated interpretations of Renaissance styling are evident in two buildings designed in 1898 by Coombs, Gibbs & Wilkinson, Grant's Clothing Store, 46 Lisbon Street, and Peck's Department Store, 184 Main Street. The latter structure originally featured a design influenced by the contemporary work of Louis L. Sullivan and is scheduled for restoration.

The early twentieth century saw a continuing tradition of eclectic design, such as the Bergin Block, 350 Lisbon Street (1913), erected as a tavern, and the Maine Supply Company Building, 415-417 Lisbon Street (1911), an early automobile garage and repair shop designed by William R. Miller, one of Maine's most flamboyant architects. At the same time more sophisticated interpretations of Renaissance styling continued to be built. The Manufacturers National Bank Building, 145 Lisbon Street (1914) is one of the tallest buildings in the city and was built with a steel curtain frame and brick and stone facing.
