DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE


The Pilla House, which is considered the most elaborate and best constructed house built in Eudora, is a two and one-half story irregularly shaped structure with a full basement. The Victorian-style mansion sits on high ground overlooking the town square to the west. It is located in a residential area about one block north of the town's business district. It measures nearly 50 feet long and a dominant tower over the west entrance reaches three full stories above the ground.

The exterior walls are built of wood frame covered with narrow horizontal clapboards. The building rests on a stone foundation which encloses the basement. Covering the walls of the entrance tower are wood shingles with angled corners, which give a diamond-like pattern to the walls. The gable ends, which are separated from the walls below, are treated in a similar manner.

The roof form is a steeply pitched gable with intersecting gables on the north, west and south facades. The gables are accentuated by lace-like barge boards and squared cornices. The tower roof, which originally was pyramidal, is now flat. The roof overhangs the walls and is supported by evenly spaced wooden brackets around the perimeter. A large porch beginning at the front entry wraps around the west and south sides and has a shingled sloping roof. Small gables in the porch roof mark entrances on the west and south sides. Ornamental wood columns with carved brackets support the porch roof. Windows on all floors are simple rectangles of the double-hung type. Stained glass was originally used in the front door.

On the interior the original hardwood floors are still in good condition, but the present owner has covered them with linoleum. (The health of the present occupants did not permit them to maintain the wood floors as they wished, so the linoleum, which can easily be removed, was installed.) The dining room and the parlor have corner fireplaces with frames and hearths of Italian marble in flowered patterns.

Except for the removal of the tower's pyramidal roof and the window shutters, the Pilla house has changed very little in exterior appearance. The interior likewise has not been greatly altered. The original stained woodwork is still in place and presents a very charming appearance. The original privy with its decorative top still stands behind the house.

The Charles Pilla house was erected in 1894 at a time when the German-born merchant was mayor of Eudora. Born in Bavaria in 1830, Pilla came to the United States in 1849 and to Eudora in 1865, where he joined his brother Frederick who had opened a small store three years earlier. After Frederick's death in 1871, Charles expanded the business until it was the largest general merchandise store in the community. It handled everything from household goods to agricultural implements and, later, automobiles.

In addition to his mercantile interests, he was involved in many other business activities. He helped organize the Eudora State Bank in 1892 and served as its president until his death in 1916. He was a partner in the brick manufacturing firm of Pilla and Statler, and an investor in other Eudora and area enterprises, and the owner of a number of farms. He served the community as postmaster (1871-1885), mayor, councilman and school board director.

The construction of his large, impressive Victorian mansion began in early March, 1894, and the Eudora News of May 31, 1894, announced, "Mayor Pilla's new residence is progressing rapidly, under the supervision of Mr. Nadelhoffer of Lawrence. When completed it will probably be the largest and handsomest residence house in the township. It will cost \$10,000 or more when completed." (William Nadelhoffer was the prominent Lawrence builder who later supervised the construction of Green Hall at the University of Kansas campus in 1905. Green Hall has previously been nominated to the Register.) The lumber used in the house was cut from timber on the various farms Pilla owned and planed at a Lawrence mill.

Work on the house continued through the summer and on October 4, the newspaper noted that the residence had received its first coat of paint and would probably be ready for occupancy by November 1. The Pilla family occupied the house until 1963 when an 86-year-old daughter was removed to a rest home.

Charles Pilla was for 50 years a respected businessman in Eudora, one who allowed customers to pay off their charges at his store with produce such as eggs and butter. Having experienced poverty himself, he helped many poor German emigrants get their start in the Eudora area. He was a generous contributor to local charities and a leader in projects promoting and improving his community. Few, if any other individuals, had as much influence on the growth and prosperity of

Eudora as Charles Pilla.
