Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Hardin House is a c.1885 one-story frame dogtrot located in a woodland setting some three miles west of the small community of Sicily Island. Despite various alterations over the years, the house retains its National Register eligibility as a rare example of the Upland South building tradition within Catahoula Parish.

The house has a five bay gallery across the front and a pitched roof. There is a room off each side of what was once a completely open dogtrot. Behind the south room is a much smaller linear room which is probably original. The rear of the dogtrot opens onto the gallery of an ell wing containing a dining room/kitchen and a bedroom. The chamfered columns on this wing appear to be salvaged. Windows in the Hardin House are six over six, and the doors have four raised panels.

The interior spaces are relatively plain, as might be expected. The only styled elements are the two vernacular Italianate mantels in the front rooms. Each features fluted pilasters, brackets supporting the shelf, and a bull's eye motif. Floors in all but one of the rooms are original.

When the present owner acquired the house in 1983, it had been rental property for some time and was in a quite rundown and altered state. Asbestos siding had been installed, and the dogtrot had been enclosed on both ends. In renovating the house, the new owner re-opened the front of the dogtrot. (Ripping off the enclosure revealed the original framing members.) The enclosed back of the dogtrot had a fairly small doorway. The new owner left the back enclosed, but made a much wider and taller opening using salvaged double doors and screen doors. (The opening is so large that when the doors are open, there is the semblance of a completely open dogtrot.) The asbestos siding remains. The only portion that is not covered is the dogtrot.

In addition to the work on the dogtrot, the mid-1980s renovation involved the following:

(1) Due to rot, the original simple porch posts (without capitals) were encased in boards. Comparing before and after photos reveals that the look is quite similar.

(2) The rear gallery was glazed in. It was enclosed at the end and a salvaged stained glass door was inserted.

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(3) The plank walls and ceilings were covered with sheetrock.

(4) Metal shutters were installed.

(5) The gallery balustrade and fronts steps were built. The house had lost its original balustrade. A c.1900 photo showed the original and was used as the basis for the replacement.

(6) Quarter round was added around the interior fenestration.

(7) The small room to the rear of the south front room was converted to a bathroom.

(8) A carport was added to the rear of the ell wing.

(9) A standing seam metal roof was installed. (The original roof was wood shingles. When the present owner acquired the house, it had a tin roof.)

Assessment of Integrity:

Despite the various changes, the Hardin House is still a legitimate expression of the Upland South building tradition. The house is still obviously a dogtrot despite the enclosure of the rear of the dogtrot corridor. In any event, dogtrots are such rare survivors in Catahoula Parish that even a slightly compromised example is quite significant.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Hardin House is locally significant in the area of architecture as a rare example of the Upland South building tradition within Catahoula Parish. It is one of only three surviving dogtrots in a parish where they once must have been fairly numerous.

Dogtrots are rightly regarded by cultural geographers as the "emblem" of the Upland South culture of North Louisiana. The earliest examples are of log construction and represent the pioneer phase of settlement (1840s and '50s), with later examples being of frame construction. The type was so popular that it survived into the twentieth century. For functional reasons, dogtrot corridors have more often than not been enclosed.

The northern Louisiana parish of Catahoula was created in 1808 and has been identified by cultural geographers as an area where the Upland South building tradition dominated. Given this cultural influence and the early date for the parish, dogtrots must have once been fairly common. It is the sort of house one would probably have found on any good size farm. However, today there are only three examples according to the 1986 historic structures survey of Catahoula. As a rare surviving symbol of a once prevalent building tradition, the Hardin House is quite significant in the architectural history of Catahoula Parish.

Historical Note:

The c.1885 date is based upon the architectural evidence and a threefold increase in the selling price between 1884 and 1886. Oliver Goldsmith Ballard purchased the property in 1884 for \$200 and sold it to John C. Hardin for \$600 in 1886. The Hardin family owned the house until 1983, when it was purchased by the present owner, Barbara Peck Gilbert. Gilbert named the property Harts' Crossing.
