

The spectacular self-supporting gothic arch dome roof of this true-round barn is the only one of its kind known to have been built on an Iowa farm. In 1981, in a successful effort to preserve this unique barn, the Tonsfeldt Round Barn was moved from its original location on the former Tonsfeldt farm west of Le Mars, Iowa to the Plymouth County Fair grounds in Le Mars. It is now used during the days of the Plymouth County Fair for crafts, antiques, art, and horticultural exhibits. The barn was originally built to house Mr. Tonsfeldt's purebred Polled Herefords and Tonsfeldt's prized bull, Ito's Perfection. While most true-round barns have conical or gambrel roofs, this dome roofed barn is an example of the diversity and variation found within the theme of Iowa Round Barns. Built during the peak years for construction of round barns, 1910-1920.




Fig. 26. Plan of round barn

Floor plan




Fig. 25. Round barn

Criteria Consideration: Moved Building:

This property was at first not accepted by the Review Committee because it had been moved from its original site. I consulted by phone with our NPS Reviewer, Ms. Beth Grosvenor and SHPO was advised as follows: The Thematic nomination did not attempt to take into account the farmsteads themselves, only the barns were evaluated. The loss of association with the farmstead therefore was not a direct issue. The nomination is a historical one, the integrity test being the state of preservation of original barn fabric. This barn is not only externally intact but the rare wood silo which gives it its significance within this nomination typology, was carefully preserved in the move. Lastly because of the rareness of the domed roof profile in the state, it was felt by staff that the preservation of the resource outweighed the loss of site/setting integrity inflicted by the move. The Review Committee agreed at a second review.
