Describe present and historic physical appearance:

SUMMARY

This c. 1900 one-room, wood-frame, one-story schoolhouse, painted red with white trim and roofed with corrugated sheet metal, sits at the edge of a wheat field typical of the eastern part of Independence County. The Hulsey Bend School is adjacent to an early 20th-century farmstead, including a house and barn, along with other more recent buildings such as a small house, stable, and agricultural storage facilities.

ELABORATION

The school building faces north, and the front facade has an arched vent in the gable. Both the front and rear elevations feature a single centered door of relatively recent vintage. The eastern elevation has three, one-over-one double-hung wood-framed windows, and an interior brick flue penetrates the roof. The western elevation also has three windows; however, these are four-over-four double-hung wood windows. The only stylistic feature of this simple vernacular balloon-frame building is the use of a small amount of molding at the top of the corner boards to suggest capitals. Concrete steps lead to both doors. Adjacent to the school is

the original water pump, also painted red. It is considered a contributing object. A wooden flagpole, not original to the site, sits northwest of the building.

The interior walls and ceiling are clad in beaded board. Approximately four feet from the front exterior wall is a partition running across the building, with door openings at each side. On the schoolroom side of the partition is the blackboard. About half of the original wooden desks remain on the west side of the room. The cast iron pot-bellied stove still sits near the flue on the east side. A few shelves were installed on the back wall in the 1960s to hold donated schoolbooks. The present pine tongue-and-groove flooring was installed over the original floor in 1961, because that floor deteriorated.

Besides the changes noted above, other alterations include demolition of the raised platform at the center front of the classroom, where the teacher's desk originally sat. This feature was torn up and burned for firewood c. 1952 by tenants. On the exterior, the original steps have been replaced with concrete, some of the window sashes have been replaced, and a bell tower originally located adjacent to the western elevation was demolished (again, for firewood) in the late 1940s. The wood shingle roof was replaced with sheet metal after it was heavily damaged by storms in 1943. Accounts state that the bell tower was also damaged by these storms. At some point, the exterior was painted white with green trim rather than the present red with white trim.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above:

SUMMARY

Despite deterioration, the Hulsey Bend School exhibits a high level of architectural integrity. For these reasons the Hulsey Bend School is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local significance as an exemplary representative of a vernacular c. 1900 school building in Independence County and the best example of such in the Oil Trough area. Also contributing to the nomination is the adjacent water pump.

ELABORATION

Around the turn of the century, twenty or more families lived in the Hulsey Bend area of Independence County, a large horseshoe-shaped bend in White River (named for a pioneering family whose members included Kelley M. Hulsey, a Justice of the Peace, constable, and owner of prime farmland along the riverbank). Mostly tenant families, they farmed cotton with horses and mules. This part of the county contains some of its best farmland, the "Oil Trough Bottoms," with deep, rich soil. The area is also high enough above the river not to be regularly flooded. The 1889 Goodspeed history of the area stated that crop yields were one to one-and-one-half bales of cotton, fifty to a hundred bushels of corn, or twenty to forty bushels of wheat per acre.

In 1898 Mr. Jeff Long, a prosperous landowner at Hulsey Bend, was persuaded to allow a side room of his plantation commissary to be used for a school one summer term. A second term was taught there in 1899. At that time Long held 250 acres of prime farmland. In 1900 the Hulsey Bend School was constructed adjacent to Long's home and near the commissary on land donated by Johnson Fields. Long was a progressive community leader who had Delco system lighting and running water in his rural home before World War I. After his death about 1917, his widow sold the property, including the school site, to her brother Zed Griffith, who lost everything in the early Depression to a Newport, Arkansas, bank. In 1931, the property was purchased by W. J. Freeze, whose son still owns it.

The one-room school accommodated first through eighth grade classes, with as many as 65 children attending during a single term. Over thirty teachers served the school between its opening in 1900 and its last term in the summer of 1947, when it consolidated with the Oil Trough Public

Schools. The building also served as a community center, with an afternoon Sunday School taught there for many years in the late 1930s and early 1940s. A handful of the oldest citizens still living in the area remember attending school and other community events there.

After several years of neglect, the school was repaired by the present owner and opened to school groups and other groups who wished to tour. For a time it was listed as a site that could be visited by Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts who wished to earn a badge related to Arkansas heritage.

This modest vernacular structure is typical of the one-room schools once found all across the country. In 1889, Independence County had eighty-one school districts, many of those with more than one school location. Hulsey Bend, for instance, was one of four small schools operated by the District 95 School Board. The others were located at Elmo, Gum Chapel, and Beeler. All these schools provided educational opportunities for rural children and served as centers for their communities. These simple buildings were an important part of the American dream that each generation could have a life better than that of its parents. With improvements in transportation and higher educational expectations, these schools were consolidated to form larger centralized districts, the buildings continued useful lives in some cases as churches or community gathering places. Hulsey Bend School, the last surviving one-room school in Independence County, typifies these common experiences.

Despite deterioration, the Hulsey Bend School exhibits a high level of architectural integrity. For these reasons the Hulsey Bend School is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local significance as an exemplary representative of a vernacular c. 1900 school building in Independence County and the best example of such in the Oil Trough area. 
