DESCRIPTION

The Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity House of Nebraska Wesleyan University in Lincoln, Nebraska, is a two and one half-story, red-brick Period Revival structure located at 5305 Huntington Avenue in Lincoln, Lancaster County, Nebraska. The architects were Harry Meginnis and Edward G. Schaumberg and Frank Robey served as contractor when the fraternity was built in 1928. In 1971, a sensitive addition was completed by the architectural firm Harold Hoskins & Associates, while M.W. Anderson served as contractor.

The Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity House of Nebraska Wesleyan University is a two and one half-story structure built in 1928, located at 5305 Huntington Avenue in historic University Place, Lincoln, Nebraska. The Nebraska Wesleyan University campus is adjacent to the north, across Huntington Avenue. The brick building was designed in the Period Revival style by the Lincoln architects Meginnis and Schaumberg (Harry Meginnis and Edward G. Schaumberg). Huntington Avenue runs through the historic University Place neighborhood which is home to Nebraska Wesleyan University, a private liberal arts school which was established in 1887. Although Meginnis and Schaumberg are well-known for designing several Greek houses on the University of Nebraska-Lincoln campus, the Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity House is the only one of its kind at Nebraska Wesleyan University. Other Greek chapter houses at Nebraska Wesleyan occupy newer or severely altered houses. The Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity House is adjoined by residential homes to the south and university parking to the west and east. To the north, the fraternity is adjacent to the Marion and Marian Weary Center for Health and Fitness located on Nebraska Wesleyan's campus.

The Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity House's principal street facades are oriented towards Huntington Avenue on the north and 53rd Street on the west. The original portion of the house is built of red brick with rough clinkers interspersed in common bond (6:1 header/stretcher). The formal entrance is located on the north facade and features square piers supporting a segmental arch with returns. The north face of the original structure has six bays with four dormers above. For the older portion of the house, the first-level windows on the north facade feature blind rowlock arches infilled with headers, the second-level windows on the north facade are detailed with flat arches consisting of soldiers complete with keystone, and the third-level windows are housed in shed dormers.

The north face of the addition has four bays with two dormers above. The addition's brickwork closely follows the original portion (without the clinkers) in 5:1 common bond. The windows on the addition's north facade mimic those of the original in that the first- and second-level windows possess decorative wooden shutters and the third-level windows are also housed in shed dormers. However, there are no arches ornamenting the first- and second-level windows of the addition. The eastern end of the north face of the addition has a large blind arch which balances the entrance on the western end of the north face of the original portion of the building. The west facade facing 53rd Street features a secondary entrance containing a hood on brackets above the door. The west roof has a long shed dormer with three windows.

The rear windows to the south are functionally arranged and echo the rowlock sills consistent throughout the rest of the building. The south side also features large shed dormers. The east side of the house consists of an informal entrance leading from the parking lot to the addition which contains a kitchen and dining room with all sleeping rooms above.

The interior of the building has been altered to accommodate the addition, but still retains significant features. The north entrance leads to an entry hall opening on the formal parlor which occupies most of the first level. The dominant feature of the parlor is the fireplace on the east wall fashioned from the same wood as the wide molding found around the room. The mantel of the fireplace is inscribed with a cryptic fraternity motto.

The west entrance opens to what remains of the main stair which is now enclosed with a fire door and walls. The original chapter room survives and is located in the basement. It displays brick walls, but few other original finishes. Sleeping rooms comprise the second- and third-levels.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity House of Nebraska Wesleyan University is locally significant under Criterion A in the area of education as the only original Greek chapter house at Nebraska Wesleyan University which retains historic integrity.

Nebraska Wesleyan University

Nebraska Wesleyan University is a private liberal arts institution affiliated with the United Methodist Church. The university was established in 1887 with the construction of "Old Main" which survives and is listed on the National Register. The university was built near the city of Lincoln, Nebraska. The neighborhood surrounding the university developed as a result of the influx of students and faculty to the area, but remained a separate jurisdiction as the town of University Place until 1926, and is now known as the University Place Historic Residential District (NRHP). As the university grew and its surrounding community grew, new student organizations developed similar to those already in place at the much larger University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Nebraska Wesleyan University and Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity

The Nebraska Wesleyan University chapter of Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity began as the Orophilian literary society in October, 1888. The various literary societies evolved into Greek fraternal orders and eventually the Greek system was formally recognized at Nebraska Wesleyan in 1920. In the early days of Nebraska Wesleyan, most male students were housed in the main university building while the majority of female students boarded with neighborhood families or faculty members. As the University and the Greek chapters grew, lodging space became limited and the need for either dormitories or Greek houses became apparent. As a result, the Greek societies lobbied for approval to build their own houses in which to live and conduct fraternal business. In the mid-1920's the university finally granted approval for fraternities and sororities to construct their own chapter houses. Phi Kappa Tau began construction on their house on May 21, 1928 at 5305 Huntington Avenue, just south of the university campus. Greek organizations grew in popularity and population. Most Greek societies were short lived or experienced difficulty acquiring a permanent residence. Phi Kappa Tau has persevered and has managed to remain in the original chapter house.

There are currently 8 Greek houses surrounding the Nebraska Wesleyan campus, 4 sororities and 4 fraternities. Of these, Phi Kappa Tau is one of the oldest and the only chapter to reside in its original house. Most of the Nebraska Wesleyan Greek chapter houses are late 20th Century replacements of early 20th Century chapter houses. Alpha Gamma Delta Sorority, the only other Greek house which may have at one time qualified for designation, resides in an historic house but has been severely altered and as a result, is disqualified from consideration on the basis of loss of historic integrity. The Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity House is not only unique due to its status as the only historic Greek house on Nebraska Wesleyan's campus, it should also be noted that the architects of Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity House, Meginnis and Schaumberg, also designed the Beta Theta Pi, Alpha Phi, and Delta Tau Delta Houses, part of Greek Row Historic District (NRHP) at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. Meginnis and Schaumberg were not only well-known Lincoln architects, they were often identified with Period Revival architecture of traditional Greek houses.
