### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Laudholm Farmhouse is a two-and-one-half story wooden structure, six bays across and four deep. Three facade and one off-center rear dormer punctuate the pitched roof, and two windows occupy each gable. The clapboarded walls are framed by simple Greek Revival cornerboards and entablatures, the later dentiled. The dormer windows are framed by thin pilasters and topped with triangular pediments. The facade windows are likewise dentiled below a simple raised cornice. Unusual, however, is the fivebayed front, most often seen in Federal style houses and hardly ever appearing in mid-century.

A long multi-bayed ell extends to the rear of the main portion, and joins a smaller connecting shed sited perpendicularly to it. The shed in turn joins a barn. The ell may contain an earlier house dating from c. 1800.

A columned veranda (Colonial Revival style) extends across the facade and wraps around the southeast gable end. This was added c. 1890 but harmonizes well with the earlier work.

An octagonal Victorian gazebo stands behind and to the west of the house. The gazebo has a latticework fence and tall simple finial.

An unusual fence of unspecified date extends across a portion of the property in front of the house. It consists of widelyspaced, turned wooden posts with long iron bars running between them.

### 8. Significance



### **Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)**

This massive Greek Revival residence, built c. 1850 by Theodore Clark with porch added c. 1890 by George C. Lord, represents the most impressive and sophisticated working farmhouse in Maine. Magnificently sited on a hill with fields sloping down to Wells Bay, Laudholm Farm sits on 250 acres of rich farmland.

A small earlier residence, c. 1800, has been absorbed in the ell of the present house and two Capes (one in the Early Wells Capes Thematic Group, N. R. 12/22/79) which were farmers' residences exist nearby. A large barn stands in the rear of the main house.

George C. Lord, a financier, who purchased the property in 1881, served for a time as President of the Boston and Maine Railroad. He and his descendents kept the farm working until the 1950's. The Laudholm Farm Trust now plans to operate the property as a working farm museum and nature preserve in conjunction with the 1600 acre Rachel Carson Refuge which abuts to the northeast.

The site is the only large undeveloped saltwater farm remaining in southern Maine and is an oasis of tranquility on an otherwise cluttered coast.
