DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Friends Meeting House is a small gabled structure standing l_2^1 stories high. It is basically rectangular in shape with a lean-to projecting on one side. The exterior is extremely simple, sheathed in narrow clapboards with an unobtusive cornice. The whole structure is painted white. The windows, of which there are eight on the principal floor and one in each gable, are rectangular and are sash hung in a six over six pattern. A small chimney is located on the slope of the roof at the back. The one entrance is found on the narrow side of the lean-to facing the road.

The interior is divided into three parts under an unfinished attic. The entrance opens into a vestibule lighted by two windows. Opposite the windows are two doors, each leading into one of the rooms of the meeting house proper. The main body of the meeting house is rectangular and is divided equally by an interior partition. This partition is most unusual in that it is solid along its base and sides but contains a large shutter in the middle section, hinged at the top and fastened to the ceiling of the front room when open. Its function was to separate men and women during meeting but to allow communication when speaking occurred. Both rooms feature a simple paneled wainscot up to the level of the windows. Above, the walls are covered with plaster. The ceiling is flat and plastered, while the corner posts are exposed and paneled. Both rooms are lighted by three windows, one on each of its exterior walls.

Both sections are furnished with pews. Those of the front room (originally the men's section) appear to be original. They are simple and highbacked. The pews of the back section are more elaborate, possessing curved, scrolled arm rests. These probably date from a turn of the century refurbishing which included the addition of the simple parlor organ that is located in this section.

Aside from these minor changes, the fabric of the building appears to be entirely original, an amazing survival from 1814. It is basically sound, and continues to occupy its original foundation and site on Quaker Ridge, commanding a view of the surrounding countryside, and the White Mountains beyond.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This modest structure on Quaker Ridge in Casco is the oldest surviving meetinghouse of the Society of Friends in the State of Maine. The meetinghouse was constructed in 1873 when Casco was part of Raymond and Maine part of Massachusetts. It is unusually well preserved, retaining a considerable amount of its original interior. The only modification occurred in the late 19th century when the west wall was enlarged slightly to provide for a harmonium, a somewhat unusual feature for a Quaker congregation. Quaker meetings were generally quiet affairs with speaking and especially singing rare.

The Friends Meeting at Casco was organized in 1802 by settlers from nearby Windham, whose own meeting dates from 1779. Quakerism in Maine made its first appearance in 1662 when a group of Frieds, escaping persecution in New Hampshire, held a meeting at what is now South Berwick. This group soon left for Boston, however, and the first established religious worship by the Society of Friends was at Eliot in 1730. The Falmouth (now Portland) Meeting dates from 1740 and was a source of much discontent among the town's Congregationalists and other more conservative sects well into the 1780's. In spite of such intolerance, Quakerism continued to spread throughout what is now York and Cumberland Counties, then Maine's most settled areas. Meetings were founded at South Berwick (1742), Harpswell (1751), Durham (1771) and Windham (1779). Gradually, after the end of the Revolutionary War and the establishment of the Federal government, persecution became rare. With the opening of the Maine hinterlands in the last decade of the 18th century and first decades of the 19th century, a Quaker meeting became a feature of many communities in Southern and Central Maine.

Nathaniel Hawthorne spent much of his childhood in Casco in the home of his uncle, Richard Manning. In his first diary, written as a boy, Hawthorne paid the Friends of Casco a gracious compliment, noting that "They never cheat".

The Friends Meeting House was used as the site of Casco's first town meeting when it was set off from Raymond in 1841. Regular Sunday meetings were discontinued in 1921 and until 1956 one annual meeting was held there. Since then it has been used for regular Sunday meetings during July and August by Friends who are largely summer residents of the Sebago Lake area.


