The Napa Opera House is located at 1018-1030 Main Street on the east side of the street. It is a two-story brick building with a frontage of 60 feet and a depth of 100 feet.

The second story contains the Napa Opera House. The front facade has three triblet windows. At the north end of the building is a 7-foot stairway leading up to the Opera House.

The ground level contains three stores—a bar, a clothing store, and a Chinese restaurant. The ground floor facade has changed several times since the building was built. A fire escape was added to the front.

The rear facade is basically unchanged. Stairs leading to the stage and a balcony leading to am adjacent hotel were removed at an early date.

Description of the interior:

The Napa Opera House auditorium is 54-1/2 feet wide and 76 feet long with a flat floor. The stage is at the east end. Some of the stucco has fallen from the south wall exposing the bricks. A portion of the ceiling has fallen exposing the roof rafters.

The entrance to the auditorium is from the north in the middle of the auditorium. At the head of the stairs outside the auditorium entrance is the ticket office. Behind this office is a small ladies' powder room. Stairs at either side of the proscenium wall lead to backstage and to the side boxes. There is a balcony or gallery at the west end reached by a curved staircase at the north-west end of the auditorium. The railing and posts were removed several years ago.

The proscenium arch is about 7 feet deep and 27 feet wide. There is a box on either side of the arch. The pilaster and the box railing on the left (stage right) side were removed several years ago. The top of the arch is painted white, red and with green stripes.

The stage is 20 feet deep and 60 feet wide and has an approximately 4° rake. The floor is worn with a trap center stage and a footlight trough downstage. There are several grooves in the floor running from holes in the floor upstage right and left. There is a brick wall at the rear with three doors which originally led to a walkway since removed. Stairs (covered now) going to the trap area and dressing rooms underneath the stage are on either side of the stage. On the rear wall is painted a scene with a wind-mill. There is very little remaining in the flies.

While in operation during its brief 34 years, many of the great and near great have performed in the Napa Opera House. David Warfield (a famous actor with David Belasco in New York) made his stage debut here in 1888.7 James A. Hearne played here in his HEARTS OF OAK. The Opera House was a common stop for the many minstel companies which toured California during the late 19th Century. Zamloch, a famous magician, played here in 1884.8 The concert singers Patti and Terazzini each held well received concerts within the hall. Animal acts and lectures filled out the programs. It also served as a community hall for many civic balls, amateur theatricals, high school functions, and other civic celebrations.

A gas border light, a gas "distributor" remains of the gas stage lighting system. There also remains holders in the ceiling for the grooves which assisted in the changing of the scenery.
